

William was likely a brother to Lewis. Abner could be son of William, or son of Lewis, and therefore a brother to Edmond.

Somehow the Penlys and the Comptons are related to the Coffees. On a later Census, Jane Compton was living with a Coffee, and on the 1850 Census, Sarah Penly, age 9, was living with William and Sarah Coffey.

Then came four other familes: Hutchens, Mehaffe, Born & Step. Then came: Benjamin Bagby, very young. Next: Scruggs, Allen & Strayhorn. Next: Thomas Bagby (20-30) and family. Benjamin Bagby and Thomas Bagby were probably brothers to Dianah Bagby, wife of Edmond Coffee. Next:

Edmon Coffee, M 2(Under 5), 2(5-10), 1(30-40); F 1(Under 5), 2(5-10), 1(20-30).

Edmond and Dianah had six children in ten years, all born in Gwinnett County. One of William's daughters probably married Samuel Born. Apparently the first wife of Lewis Coffee died 1830-1840. Female (30-40) could be second wife, or could be daughter (Loaney?) who had come home with her three children. The three younger children certainly do not belong to Lewis Coffee's first wife.

If William was a brother to Lewis, the father of them (John?) must have moved from Virginia to North Carolina, between 1777 and 1784.

My mother, Eugenia Elizabeth Coffee of Jackson, Miss. during one of her school vacations as invited by her uncle, Gen. Holland Coffee and his wife, Sofia, to visit them at Port Washita, Indian Territory, which place does not now existand while visiting there at Port Washita met Charles Ashton Galloway who was young and handsome and after a short courtship he and my mother married. My mother was 14 and Mr. Galloway 28. They were the parents of three sons and a daughter inside 6 years. The first born, George Washington Galloway, the second son Charles Ashton Galloway, third son Alexander David Galloway. The daughter was Virginia Lee Galloway. My mother Mrs Charles Ashton Galloway nee Eugenia Elizabeth Coffee remarried in a few years Alexander Goodrich of Norfolk, Va. and shortly after moved to New Orleans, La. where several Goodrick children were born, I being the youngest of the children. George Washington Coffee Galloway married when 20 years of age Sara Gatlin of Tangipahoa Parish, La., a beautiful girl in her teens whose forefathers were among the early settlers of La. and it is George Galloway and his wife Saras grand daughter for whom I am getting this information. This is a copy of a letter written by Mrs. E.E. McLemore, Sara Goodrich, to one of her relatives concerning her family. She said her mother had an uncle named Holland Coffee and also a

ELI COFFEE came to the colony as a single man prior to July 1, 1848. He was issued Fannin Third Class Certificate No. 1571 for 320 acres, which he sold unlocated and which was later patented in Grayson County. He was illiterate.

HIRAM COFFEE migrated to the colony as a family man prior to July 1, 1848. He received a certificate from Thomas William Ward, and his heirs patented 640 acres in Cooke County (Fannin Third Class No. 1315). He was listed on the 1850 census (Grayson County, family No. 206) as a 50-year-old farmer, with four children. Born in Tennessee, he came to Texas from Indiana.

JAMES S. COFFEE migrated to the colony as a family man prior to July 1, 1848. He was issued Fannin Third Class Certificate No. 588 for 640 acres, which he sold unlocated and which was later patented in Grayson County. He is listed on the 1850 census (Grayson County, family No. 251) as a 27-year-old farmer, with three children. Born in Indiana, he migrated to Missouri, then to Cherokee Nation, then to Texas.

Washington Coffee migrated to the colony as a single man prior to July 1, 1848. He was issued a land certificate by Thomas William Ward in 1850, which was sold unlocated and was later patented in Grayson County (Fannin Third Class No. 1345). He is listed on the census of 1850 (Grayson County, family No. 206) as a 21-year-old laborer, born in Indiana.

WILLIAM COFFEY was issued a certificate for 640 acres by the county court of Cooke County in 1853 which he patented in Parker County (160 acres, Robertson Third Class No. 4325; 63.7 acres, Robertson Third Class No. 3762). Since the remainder of the certificate was never patented and since the claim was disapproved in 1857, it is doubtful that Coffey was a bona fide colonist.

THE COFFEE FAMILY LIVED AROUND WARTRACE IN BEDFORD COUNTY

Wartrace was an "old stomping ground"in Bedford County, and was the second largerst town in Bedford County. The land on which the town was located had been owned by Rice Coffee and Henry B. Coffey, evidently brothers.

Alezander H. Coffee, will August 1st, 1865"now in Jackson County, Alabama" but "home in Bedford County, Tenn". Copied from the records of Bedford County, Dated August 1, 1865. He mentions: "My grand son Avery Lovelady, son of Pleasant and Mary E. Lovelady, formerly Mary E. Coffee"

The Rice Coffey(son of the Alexander of the above will) was a younger Rice Coffee. There was an older one of the name, who wrote the following letter in 1844 to Jefferson Coffee, whose sister Ametica Coffee married Sanuel Luck, who went to Texas and settled in the early days! The letter throws more light on the Coffee Family of Bemford County:

Shelbyville, Tenn November 15, 1844

Dear Jefferson:

I recaived your letter of the 16th of September and have read it with entertaining interest. Indeed, it is always a source of gratification to me to hear that my friends are doing will.

You request some information respecting the history of our ancestors. I have no written biography of the COFFEE FAMILY and therefore can only relate to you such facts as have come within my own recollection and such as have reached me by tradition.

I remember to have seen my patermal grandfather. His name was John Coffee, and he was raised in one of the lower counties of Virginia and died in Albemarle. My grandmother's maider name was Jane Graves, and my father's name was James Coffee. He also was raised in the lower part of Essez and from thence to Albemarle, where your father Ambrose Coffee was born in the year 1762. From this county my father (James) removed to Amherst and here his children grew up to manhood. My mother's maiden name was Elizabeth Cleveland. My maternal grandfathers's name was Alexander Cleveland. He was a descendant of the English and was an own cousin of Oliver Cromwill, a gentleman who figured conspicuously in the sixteenth century. He was raised in Virginia and born in the year 1663 and died in 1775, at the age of 112 years.

My father was born in 1729 and died in 1786. His children were nine sons and two daughters. My brothers names were John, Archelaus, James, Reuben, Ambrose, Eli, Joel and LewisCoffee. They are all dead save Eli and Lewis, the first of whom resides in Missouri and the other in Kentucky,

I became acquainted with your maternal grandfather Jesse Moore about the close of the revolutionary was. He then lived in Burke County, N. C., where you were born. He was born in Virginia, and many of his descendants now live in Kentucky.

I am still living at the same place you last saw me, but cannot

expect, in the course of nature to remain much longer. now in my 80th year. May God bless you.

The following letter was copied from the Vertical Files in the Tennessee State Library and Archives at Nashville, Tenn. on October 11, 1973 by Walker Jackson Coffey

On May 28, 1925 John Royal Harris, President of Cumberland University at Lebanon, Tenn. wrote a letter to Mr. John Trotwood Moore, State Historian, Nashville, Tenn. The letter states:

In the Vertical Files of the Tenn. State Library and Archives at Nashville, Tenn. there is a clipping from The Memphis Commercial Appeal dated June 15, 1942 Dropped Stitches in Southern History reading as follows:

Records of Tennesseeans who enlisted for service in the War of 1812 include the name of Pleasant Coffey who enlisted as a Private on Oct. 4, 1813 under Capt Kennedy and Colonel Bradley. He was a rifleman and was discharged at Nashville. There are others who spelled the name Coffee. The most prominent member of that family was perhaps Gen. John Coffee. He was bosn in Va. in 1772 and died near Florence, Ala. in 1833. He and his mother settled on the Cumberland River in 1798 and he married a niece of Andrew Jackson. He was a great friend and associate of Gen. Andrew Jackson who wrote the fine epitaph for Gen. Coffees tombstone. In the Census of Tenn. 1820 we find the heads of several families as follows: John Coffee Rutherford County David Coffee Smith County John Coffee Perry County Thomas S. Coffee Warren County Jesse Coffee Warren County Absalum Coffee Bedford County Nancy Coffee Bedford County Rice Coffee Bedford County John Coffee Lincoln County Hughey Coffee Maury County Jane Coffee Maury County In Maury County we find 2 sketches in Goodspeeds History, one spelled Coffee and one spelled Coffey. Dr. William O'Coffee was born in Ballard County, Ky. in 1859 removed to Illinois, later to Missouri, then to Indiana, later to Kansas, New York and Pennsylvania where he practiced medicine before settling in Tennessee. He forst lived in Wilson County near Lebanon and three months later settled in Columbia, Tenn. where both his father and grandfather were well known citizens. His father was William Coffee and his grandfather was Nathan Coffee The second Maury County sketch was of Joseph M. Coffey born 1844 son of Hugh W. and Jemima Coffey. Joseph Coffey was a Confederate soldier and married Maggie J. Coker who was born in Missouri in 1858

(Editor's Note: The data that follow have not been published to the best of our knowledge. The source material from which the data were originally copied has been destroyed. Many Montgomery County records still exist: The Deed and Grant books begin in 1787; Wills, Inventories and Guardian Bonds begin in 1797; the Court Minutes begin in 1805; the preserved Marriage Records begin in 1838; and the Minute Books begin in 1840. Information in these records may be of help in obtaining proof of these early marriages for which the original records no longer exist.)

A copy of these data was contributed by Anita Whitefield Darnell (Mrs. Sinclair), 638 Madison Street, Clarksville, Tennessee 37040. Mrs. Darnell reports that about 1938, when Harry Smith was County Court Clerk, Louise Dickson Townley (Mrs. Earl J.), 103 Union Street, Clarksville, was "Ansearchin'", and in a drawer found some fragments of paper, some burned. Mrs. Townley copied these marriage records from those fragments. Somehow the fragments were destroyed later. The early marriage records are believed to have burned in the 1876 or 1900 courthouse fires.

The following data have been checked against Mrs. Townley's copy. The names appearing after those of bride and groom are those of the bondsmen.

Salina Co., Ill. Oct. the 21st 1878 Dear children; We are in common health; in answer to your request I must say that I am quite imadequite to give the necessary information as my Father was raised an orphan boy and had a very limited acquaintance with the original stock of our family relatives; the Coffey portion of the family emigrated from Ireland, and I have frequently heard it said by the old members of the connection that there were two brothers who came to America and raised eleven sons apiece from which the numerous stock has sprung, but I cannot give their names; the time of their arrival or where they located; but should judge either in Virginia or the Carilinas as they have emigrated from there to the west ever since my first recollection. They have been a family noted for morality and industry and generally well to do, good livers, some farmers, some mechanics, some ministers of the Gospel and some lawyers amongst them. My grand mother on my father's side by the name of Waid. I think her parents came direct from Ireland but I can not give their mames nor place of their locality; her maiden name was Elon Waid. My great grand mother Coffey lived to the advanced age of one hundred and twelve as you will see in my history; she was a sister of Col. Cleavton of the Revolutionary War who it is said weighed seven hundred pounds before his death. My grand father Coffey died about one hundred years ago in North Carolina; his name was Achilles Coffey. Governor Cullom the present governor of Illinois and I are grandsons of brothers; he of Lewis and I of Achilles. On my mothers side her fathers name was Thomas Lane; I think he was of English descent. He died at minety six years of age in Southern Illinois. He had lived in Virginia, North Carolina and N.Y. raised in the Quaker pursuasion bu finally espoused the Baptist faith. My grand mother on my mothers side was of Welsh descent; her name was Nancy Dabney before her marriage. There were some sons of distinction amongst them but I am not able to give their history. If you wish any information as to your mothers genealogy I can only go back to your grand father whose name was Jacob Deen, a minister of the Gospel of the Methodist order; he claimed to be of German descent. Your grand mother's maiden name was Susan Hattey and had some relationship to the Henry Clay family. This is about all I can think of that would come in the bounds of your request and this may not.

COFFEY, REUBEN (S46916, N. C. service, Ky. Agcy.; Cert. 22363 issued 31 Oct. 1833, Act 7 June 1832, at S40 per an.).

He apld. 28 Aug. 1832 from Wayne Co., Ky. He was b. 16 Sept. 1759 in Albemaric Co., Va., and lived there 15 yr.; then moved to Wilkes Co., N. C., near the head of the Adkin river where they lived for 14 yr.; then to Burke Co., 22 yr. They then moved to Wayne Co., Ky., about 13 yr. ago. He volntd. 17 June 1780 in Wilkes Co., N. C., in Capt. Moses Guest's Co. of Horse (with Lt. Thomas Ferguson, Majs. Hartgrove and Winston), Col. Benjamin Cleaveland's Regt. He was in the battle of King's Mountain and marched with prisoners to wid. Binkerstaff's house where 9 Tories were condemned in court martial. Ens. Guest, deponent, and 5 or 6 others of his Co. were detached to quell the Tories on the frontier. He went on several small expeditions and was dischgd. in Wilkes Co. in the fall of 1781.

Martin Durham declared that he was with Reuben Coffey at King's Mountain battle and at many other places.

Lewis Coffey testified that he was a bro. of Reuben Coffey. Dallas (TX) Morning News, "Tolbert's Texas", unknown dates.

Coffee's Killer ongratulated

By FRANK X. TOLBERT

TIWO REAL ESTATE developers have a petition before the state board of morticians to move off their Gravson County property the body of an ornery old Indian trader and Republic of Texas corfiressman, Col. Holland Coffee. The Coffee remains, removed once before when Lake Texoma was inundated, are now in an ancient brick mausolcum near the Preston Point shore of the big lake.

The disagreeable Colonel Coffee was shot to death in 1846 while having a difficulty with one Charles A. Galloway. And Mr. Galloway was congratulated for this by a Clarksville, Texas, newspaper, The Sandard: "Galloway was acquitted by public sentiment . . . it has so clearly a case of self defense in the last extremity that the grand jury could not find a bill."

COFFEE WAS ONE of the first settlers of the country around Sherman. He was there by 1833, and probably some years earlier. He was said to speak seven Indian dialects, and to have a pacifying influence on the Kiowas, Comanches, and other big and ugly-acting Indians of the Red River Valley.

Certainly he was the master of ceremonics at a number of pow wows between the settlers and the redmen. And his widow claimed, probably erroneously, that he arranged a treaty meeting at Pike's Peak in Colorado. Colfee was popular enough in 1838 to get himself elected to the Texas congress. And the legislation he sponsored was very favorable to the Indian traders' lobby.

The colonel acquired a lot of land and slaves. But there was a nasty rumor that his real business was exchanging whiskey and guns to the Indians for livestock.

IN 1839, COFFEE became L second husband of Sophia iuttonfield Aughinbaugh, one of the Republic of Texas' most colorful! women. Sophia was lady of great. beauty, zest, and imagination. Graham Landrum, in his admir-! ably researched Illustrated History of Grayson County, says that Sophia was probably a prostitute while she was following the Republic of Texas Army in 1836.

Grayson County gossip, perhaps untrue, was that Collee and Galloway were quarreling over Sophia! when the husband was shot.

Sophia's spouses did have tough luck, though.

HER THIRD hubby, Maj. George N. Butt, went to Sherman in 1863 to sell his cotton; and was ambushed and slain on his way home with the money. Her fourth and final husband Judge James Porter, died in 1885, of disabilities going back to his service as a Confederate soldier.

Sophia, who lived in one of the grandest mansions on the Red River, Glen Eden, built the mausoleum for Colonel Coffee while her other husbands found more humble burial places.

Some interesting data on the Coffey family has come from Mrs. Ransom Griffin, Sr., \$231 Wellington Drive, Indianapolis 20, Indiana. In speaking of the will of James Coffey (page 14, March issue of The North Carolinian), she says: "My brother, Fred B. Dyer, Attorney of Worthington, Indiana, found this will many years ago, but where, I can't say. Fred is ill, and blind now so I am sure it would be useless to ask him. I do know he started the Coffey Genealogy before 1916, when some of the generation of our grandfather was still living. James Coffey was our great-great-grand-father." Mrs. Griffin gives the children of James Coffey as follows: Wife Elizabeth, daughter Betty Whitesides, sons John, James, Reuben, Ambrose, Ely, Rice, daughter Nartha Durham, sons Joel and Lewis. Above Rice Coffey wrote a letter from Shelby-ville, Tenn., in 1844, when he was upwards of 80 years old, giving the names as above, and in the same order, and stated that his parents were James and Elizabeth (Cleveland) Coffee, and grandparents were John and Jane (Graves) Coffey, and Alexander Cleveland (b. 1663), of Orange Co., Virginia. Mrs. Griffin is of the opinion that the Joel Coffey who left a will in 1789 was "too old" to have been the son of James, above.

II remember to have seen my paternal grandfather. His neme was JOHN COFFET. He was raised in one of the lower counties of Va. and died in Albemerle. My grandmother's maiden name was JANE CRAVES, and my father's name was JAMES COFFET. He also was raised in the lower part of Virginia & from thence removed to ESSZI co. and from there to Albemarle, where your father, AMEROSE COF-FET was born in the year 1962. From this county my father removed to AMERST County and here his children grow up to manhood. My mother's maiden name was Blizaboth CLEVELAND. My maternal gr. father was ALTIANDER CLEVELAND. My father was born in 1729 and died in 1786, and his children were nine some and two daughters. My brothers were JOHN, ARCHELAUS, JAMES, REDEEN, AMERICES, HII, JOEL AND IZHIS. They are all dead mave Eli and Lewis, the first of whom resides in Missouri and the other in Kentucky. I became acquainted with your maternal gr. father, JESS MOOK about the end of the revolutionary war. He then lived in Burke County, N. C. where you were born. He was born in Va. and many of his descendents live In Kentucky. I am still living at the old home place where you last cor me, but cannot expect in the course of nature to remain much longer. I am now in my 80th year. May God bloss you. RICZ CCFFET.

JEFFERSON COFFET to whom the letter was written was brother to AMERICA COFFET wife of SAM INSK. RICS COFFET, the writer of the letter was brother of AMERICA FET, who was the father of AMERICA CA (COFFET) HISK.

HOLLAND COFFEE

HOLLAND COFFEE was an old Indian fighter, and lived at his trading post on Red River County, but when an army officer left a lone widow, Sophia Suttenfield, in Washington County, he rode all the way down from North Texas to make her his wife. This was on January 29, 1839. Holland Coffee was a relative of the lunk family, as the wife of Col. Sem Lusk was America Coffee. *Coffee's Trading Post" was on Red River in what is now Rod River County and its site, I am told, has now been inundated by the modern Red River dam. Holland Coffee was a brother of Con. John Coffee, who lived in Williamson County, Texas, near Georgetown, and Holland was on the Indian Compaign in which the celebrated JOHN B. Denton was Milled, but happened not to be present at that particular time. Aunt "Sophia" Coffee outlived her husband. who was killed and was buried at the trading post on Red River.

NOTE: The name COFFEE or COFFEE was spelled both Ways on the old records in both Tennessee and Texas, and having spent sens time in a study of this family, the writer is of the opinion that they were the same clan.

Page 113:

Col. James Coffee, better known as "Squire" Coffee, came to Baxter County in 1868. He was born in Georgia, November 3, 1819, and died in Chattanooga, Oklahoma, where he had gone in 1908, August 23, 1913. His children were: James A., Caroline (Mrs. James Leonard, Katherine (Mrs. H.K. Wilkie) Oscar, Texas, Mrs John Due, and Georgia. He was a prominent Mason, and was Justice of the Peace for many years. He first settled near Gassville where he was in the cotton ginning business, and when he moved to Mountain Home he was in the mercantile business with A.J. Truman and J.L. Leonard, his son-in-law.

James A. Coffee married Eliza Johnson in Georgia and they came here with 21 other families from that state in 1869 and settled near Gassville. He, with Tom Reed and Dick Willie set up a cotton gin there. He was a Confederate soldier and a Mason.

Eliza Johnson Coffee was the daughter of J.W. Johnson, a native of Georgia who first came to this country with government agents moving the Indians westward. After that he went back to Georgia, but after the War came back to this country and settled near Yellville.

Born to Eliza and James Coffee were the following children: John Coffee of Fort Worth, Texas; J.H. Coffee of Cassville; Henry Coffee, also of Texas; Tobe and Mrs. Beulah Green, twins who live in Texas; and Effie who married a Johnson and Moved to Georgia.

Page 128:

James L. Leonard and his wife, Caroline Winnifred Coffee Leonard, came to this county in 1869 with the Coffees and about twenty other families from Georgia, and settled near Gassville on White River. After a few years they moved to Mountain Home where Ar. Leonard was in the mercantile business in partnership with Professor A.J. Truman and Squire Coffee. James Leonard was a Lieutenant in the Confederate Army during the Civil War and rendered valliant service to the cause. He was the father of six children: Leona, George, Mrs. Ida Brooks, James, John and Oscar. He was a Mason.

COFFEY, BENJAMIN

SUMMARY OF EARLY LIFE

Born in Spotsylvania Co., Va. 1747.

SUMMARY OF MILITARY SERVICE

Benjamin Coffey entered military service in April, 1776 in Rowan Co., (later Burke Co.) N.C. as a volunteer militiaman in Captain Thomas Whitson's Company of Col. Christopher Beekman's Regiment. Other officers were Lt. Col. Charles McDowell and Captain Joseph McDowell. He served in the Cherokee Expedition of 1776 commanded by Brigadier General Griffith Rutherford. After his return from the Cherokee Expedition he assisted in building Fort Crider on Lower Creek in Burke County, now Caldwell County. At this time he was also employed as a score to keep watch on hostile Indians. He later moved from Burke County to Wilkes Co., N.C. He served in a company commanded by Captain John Barton of Colonel Benjamin Cleveland's Regiment. He served with Captain Barton against the Torics in Wilkes and Burke Counties. Later he was in the Kings Mountain Campaign. During the Kings Mountain Battle, Coffey was with the footmen of Major Benjamin Herndon and did not directly participate in the battle itself (Oct. 7, 1780). After the battle, Coffey assisted in guarding prisoners on their march to the Moravian Towns. About this time he became ill and was furloughed home. This ended his military service (November, 1780).

SUMMARY OF LATER LIFE

After the Revolutionary War, he moved from Wilkes Co., N.C. to Hawkins Co., Tenn.

Coffee applied for Revolutionary War pension in Hawkins Co., Tonn. 183? at age 86. He was awarded \$40.00 per annum.

Benjamin Coffey died January 4, 1834, Hawkins Co., Tenn.

LAND HOLDINGS AND TRANSACTIONS

Benjamin Coffey entered several pieces of land in Burke County -- mainly on Lower and Smokey Creeks, adjacent to property of John Coffey, James Elair, John Franklin and Cleveland Coffey. Land was later granted to a Benjamin Coffey in the same vicinity, possibly his son.
