The COFFEE FALILY

The Coffee family is probably of Irish origin. The direct ancestry of the family has not been clearly traced beyond a few generations. It is known that James and Rebecca Coffee were the parents of Jonathan Coffee, who married mary Collins.

In the Pennsylvania Archives is the record of a marriage license dated May 28th, 1768 to James Coffee and Rebecca Winterton, and on the following day (May 29th) their marriage appears on the records of the Christ Church, Phila. This pair were probably the parents of Jonathan Coffee.

In the records of Michael and Zion Church is a marriage of James Coffee, and Mary Sisson, on 1761, the license being dated February 14th, 1761. Possibly this was a prior marriage of the same James Coffee.

There are several records referring to the name of James Coffee - that probably refer to our James Coffee, or a preceding generation or both.

In the New Jersey Records at Trenton, is the Will of James Coffee of Newton, Gloucester County, yeoman, dated January 27, 1737, and proved April 1st, 1738. He had a wife margret (Margaret?) and a brother-in-law Joseph Ellis. This is the earliest record that has been found. This James and margaret Coffee may have been the parents of James, the father of Jonathan.

In the Philadelphia Orphans' Court Records of May 8th, 1786, are references to our family to children of James and Rebecca Coffee.

(See Orphans' Court Docket No. 13, Page 198, may 8, 1786, H.R. 26 and 27.)

James and Rebecca Coffee had children as follows: Jonathan Coffee, born at Philadelphia July 22nd, 1778. Died Feb. 19th, 1833, and was buried in the Monument Cemetery, W. of 15th St., So. of main Avenue, E. of line of Monument Avenue.

Isaac Z. Coffee of Salem, New Jersey, born in Philadelphia in 1776.

George Coffee, a Quaker.

according to the Orphans' Court Record in 1786, Priscilla was a minor over fourteen, and James, Isaac and Jonathan were under fourteen years of age.

In the Records of Gloucester County, New Jersey at Wood-bury, Deed Book D, Page 327, is a Deed dated May 30, 1800, made by ---

- 1. George Coffee, of Southwark, Phila., tanner and Currier and Grace his wife.
- 2. Priscilla, wife of Elias Morris of New Britain, Bucks Co., Penna hatter.
 - 3. Isaac Coffee of Southwark Cooper and Mary, his wife.
- 4. Jonathan Coffee of Southwark, blacksmith, mentioned as only children and heirs of James Coffee late of Philadelphia, blacksmith deceased who died intestate, owning property in Camden. New Jersey.

The marriage of Priscilla Coffee (Coffey) and Elias Lorris appears in the Swedes' Church Record under date of Aug. 8, 1791.

Isaac Z. Coffee was married twice. His first wife was mary Dare. (Note: His brother Jonathan, married Sarah Dare). Isaac Z. and Mary (Dare) Coffee had children:

On November 18, 1891, Isaac C. Smashey, Jr. married Carrie C. Johns, of Kent County, maryland. They reside in Philadelphia.

Rebecca Coffee (daughter of Isaac and Hannah) is unmarried. She is in her ö4th year (1ö90) and lives with her sister, apigail.

Hester Coffee (daughter of Isaac and Hannah) married Boston Gosling. They are both deceased. They left five children:

Thomas Gosling.

Isaac Gosling, all living.

The origin in New Jersey of the Goslin family is referred to in Clement's First Amigrant Settlers, p. 60-353.

Abigail 3. Sparks, wife of David Sparks, died at Salem, New Jersey, Peb. 23rd, 1852, in the 78th year of her age. James Coffee (son of Isaac and Hannah) died young.

Friscilla Coffee (daughter of Isaac and Hannah) married william Pierpont. They have five children living.

George F. Coffee (the first mentioned) owned a property on the south side of German Street, between Second and Third Streets.

The second George F. Coffee (son of the first) became the purchaser of the premises. He is described as a Mail Lanufacturer of Southwark. In the Directories, of 1803 and 1804, is the name of G.F. Coffee, Spring Mail Cutter, Liddle Alley.

In the Directory of 1814, is the name of George F. Coffee, Mailer, 331 South Second Street.

of the above family, George F. Coffee (the younger) married. His wife's Christian name was Margaret. A son, Henry J. Coffee survived him.

JONATHAN COFFEE (Son of James and Rebecca).

On November 11th, 1804, Jonathan Coffee (son of James and Rebecca Coffee) married mary Collins, daughter of Edward and Ann Collins. (See the Collins Family). She was his second wife. His first wife was Sarah Dare, daughter of Edward and Hannah Dare. In the list of marriage Licenses granted in Pennsylvania, previous to 1790, is the entry of a license to Edmund Dare and Hannah Bell on October 12th, 1774. These may have been the parents of Sarah Dare.

Note: Isaac, brother of Jonathan Coffee, married a Mary Dare.

Jonathan Coffee was a machinist and had a shop at the Corner of Minth Street and Ridge Avenue and later at Bush Hill. The latter was East of Seventeeth Street and extended from Hamilton to Buttonwood Streets. He had a partner named Olive Evans, the Inventor. It is related that Coffee and Evans had occasion to transport an engine that they had built for the Philadelphia Water Works, from their shop to the

Schuykill River. Joseph E. Coffee (son of Jonathan) who was present related that Evans said "Jonathan, how are we to get this out to the River?" Coffee thought a while, and replied "Why, make the thing go itself." Acting upon this thought, appliances were rigged up by which the steam engine propelled itself to the River. This is said to be the first application of steam power to locomotion on land, accomplished in America, and antedates the invention of John Stevenson. Englishman.

Some accounts also claim Evans' Invention was the first application of steam to locomotion on water. See Appleton's Cyclopedia of American Biography, Westcotts' History of Philadelphia; Watson's Annals, etc.

The following is a copy of the marriage certificate of Jonathan Coffee and Mary Collins.

Burlington, Nov. 11th, 1804.

This is to certify that on this day Jonathan Coffee and Mary Collins were united in marriage according to the order observed in the Methodist Church, by me Thomas Ware, Elder of said Church.

Jonathan and Mary Coffee had the following children:

Edward Collins Coffee born August 31st, 1805, about 4 A.M. at Philadelphia. Died September 26th, 1811.

Charles James Coffee (1) born April 30th, 1807, at 11:30 P.M. at Philadelphia. Died February 21st, 1810, and was buried in the Free Quakers Ground in Philadelphia.

Sarah Coffee (1) born July 12th, 1809, at 2:30 A.M. at Philadelphia. Died August 7th, 1810. Buried in Free Quakers Ground at Philadelphia.

Joseph Ellis Coffee born October 27th, 1810, at 2:15 A.M. at Philadelphia. Died December 5th, 1869, at 4. P.M. at Keyport. New Jersey.

Charles James Coffee (2) born October 28th, 1813, at 7.A.W. at Philadelphia. Died May 14th, 1830. Probably buried in Monument Cemetery in his father's lot.

Sarah Coffee (2) born August 30th, 1814, at 3:30 P.M. at Philadelphia.

Oliver Evans Coffee born May 5th, 1816, at 3:30 P.M. at Philadelphia. Died May 7th, 1816. Buried in Free Quakers Ground in Philadelphia.

George Wayne Coffee born June 27th, 1817, at 6:20 P.M. at Philadelphia. Died June 16th, 1888, at 1:10 P.M. Buried at Oakland, California.

Mary Coffee (1) born April 27th, 1819, at 3:20 P.M. at Philadelphia. Died February 16th, 1820.

Mary Coffee (2).

Ann Elizabeth Coffee born January 1st, 1827, at Philadelphia. She died December 6th, 1892.

It will be noticed that in the above family were two named Charles, two named Sarah and two named Mary.

Joseph Ellis Coffee married twice. His first wife was a widow, Hannah E. Babcock. She died at Philadelphia at the residence of her daughter, Mary Smith.

Joseph Ellis Coffee, Sr. (son of Jonathan and Mary) married a second time, Mary A Doty.

Joseph E. Coffee, Sr. was a machinist, Engine and Steamboat Builder. He lived in New York City and at Keyport on Raritan Bay, Monmouth County, New Jersey. He had his business headquarters in New York.

His second wife survived him and resides in New York City (1895).

He was buried in Keyport, New Jersey.

George Wayne Coffee (son of Jonathan and Mary) married twice. His first wife was Mary M. Kolick, of Lexington, Kentucky. Their only child was Mary Ann Francis Coffee, born May 3, 1848(?) in Philadelphia. She died in California about June 1886(?), two weeks before her father's decease. Her mother died when she was about nine months old.

Mary Ann Francis Coffee married her second cousin, Samuel Phillips Van Dyke, about the Spring of 1861.

George Wayne Coffee was one of the California Pioneers. He is buried in Mountain View Cemetery, Oakland, California, where his wife, who died about two and a half years before him, is also buried.

Sarah Coffee (the second daughter of that name of Jonathan and Mary) married James Oliver Haight, Machinist, etc. Mr and Mrs. Haight took up residence in Albany, New York, where she still resides.

James Oliver Haight was born November 30th, 1805 and died August 30th, 1888, at Albany New York. He was the inventor of Patent Springs for supporting steam engines &c. and his brother-in-law Joseph E. Coffee, also manufactured them.

James O. Haight, was the son of Oliver Haight, of Coeymans, and Hannah Rowe. Oliver Haight was the son of John Haight of Little Rest, Dutchess County, New York, who was born in 1730.

THE COLLINS FAMILY

There is doubt that our Collins family descended from Francis Collins, one of the original settlers of Burlington County, New Jersey. He was a son of Edward and Mary Collins of Oxfordshire, England, and was born January 6th, 1633. In 1663, he married Mary Mayham, and in 1687, he married a widow, Mary Goslin, nee Budd. There were children by both marriages including sons who had numerous descendents — so numerous as to render it difficult to trace them all. It has not been ascertained where our line (that of William Collins) joins on to the above. An account of Francis Collins' family is given in Clement's First Emigrant Settlers, page 71.

The earliest record of our Collins family is in a Bible that belonged to the parents of Ann E. (Coffee) Hopper. The names first mentioned in the family Bible are those of William and Hester Collins. They had a son, Edward Collins who was born at Glouchester, New Jersey, December 25, 1749, and died October 8, 1805, and was buried in the Kensington Burial Ground.

The estate of Edward Collins appears to have been administered in Burlington County, New Jersey.

(See Records at Mount Holly - Inventory Book A, pages 59-60). An inventory of goods and chattels, in Philadelphia, was made November 2, 1805 and appraised at \$163.65. Another Inventory made February 12, 1806, was appraised at \$78.00, probably of goods in New Jersey. There is a blank on the record at the foot of which it is stated that on February 11, 1806, John Collins and Jona. Coffee were sworn.

On April 16, 1774, Edward Collins married Ann Hudson, who was born at Sheffield, Yorkshire, England, June 14, 1752, and died May 5, 1830.

The following is a copy of their marriage certificate which is still preserved:

These are to certify that after regular Proclamation in our Michael and Zion Churches, were married April the 16th, Anno Domini 1774, Edward Collins, of Gloucester County, and Ann Hudson, of Philadelphia, Single people. Witness the public Records of these churches, now in my hands.

Henry Muhlenberg, Jun.

Lutheran Minister at Philadelphia.

The name of Hudson appears among the ancient records of Yorkshire, England, and in various genealogical records but this particular family has not yet been located among them.

Ann Hudson came to America alone when about 16 years of age, which would be about 1778.

From the family Bible, it appears that Edward and Ann Collins had the following children:

Ann Collins born November 19, 1783, at Burlington, New Jersey, at seven o'clock in the evening. Died April 8, 1856, at Philadelphia.

Mary Collins, born November 11, 1785 at Burlington, New Jersey, at 8:45 o'clock in the evening. Died October 19, 1860 at Philadelphia, and was buried in Monument Cemetery.

Joseph Ellis Collins born November 11, 1787, at Burlington, New Jersey, at four o'clock in the evening. Died April 8, 1820, at Philadelphia.

Edward Collins born March 3, 1790, at Burlington, New Jersey, at 10:45 in the evening.

Francis Bullis Collins born January 2, 1795, at 10:30 o'clock in the evening at Burlington, New Jersey.

Ruth Collins (daughter of Edward and Ann) married John Hayes and had children:
