



In the year of 1916, Mrs. Abby Dyer Griffin and her brother Fred Dyer of Worthington, Indiana, became interested in the genealogy of their family, which descended from Edward Coffey, emigrant from Ireland to America in the later part of the seventeenth century.

Together, Abby and Fred researched avidly with a goal of publishing a book on the Coffeys, so that their descendants would not be deprived of this information in the years to come. Both of them worked the remainder of their. lives, compiling all of the Coffey records available, however their dream of completing a book never became a reality.

The information in this book, for the most part, was taken from their records, and my hope is to complete this genealogy in a manner that will be a credit to their timeless efforts.

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History of the Coffey Name

<u>Webster's Dictionary</u> definition of the word "surname" is as follows, "a family name or epithet added to a person's name making it more specific and indicating family relationship or descent".

Personal names, no matter how primative, have been in existance since the development of dialogue. As early as Biblical times, additional information was attached to a given name to aid or distinguish identification, such as James the son of Alpheus, Jesus of Nazereth, or Simon the Zealot.

Surnames, as we know them were not universal until about the end of the twelfth century, and then they were not made compulsory until about 1465, during the reign of Edward V. He decreed that everyone should take unto him a surname, either of a town, a color, an art or science or a trade.¹ These names developed through the years with the addition of prefixes and suffixes denoting relationship or generations, for example the use of the suffix "son". Other préfixes and suffixes denoted geographical origins such as the English "son", "kin", and "ing"; the Gaelic "Mac", the Norman "Fitz", the Welsh "Ap", and the Irish "0".²

Using this brief summarization of the usage of surnames in the mast, let us explore the name Coffey.

COFFEY COWHIG

The Coffeys are Celts of Milesian stock. In Gaelic the family name is written O'Cobhthaigh, from the word "Cobhthaigh" which means "victorious". O'Cobhthaigh means "the descendant of the victor" and their traditional zeal for honorable victory in battle is enshrined in the family motto "Not prudence but victory".

Ancient genealogical tables trace ancestry back to Cobhthaig grandson of Olliol Flann Beag, King of Munster, 240 A.D. In early times members of the family seem to have settled in various parts of Ireland, as historical records point to several distinct septs of O'Coffeys in widely separated districts of Ireland.

Perhaps the best known, and at one time, one of the most influential of the Irish families, were the O'Coffeys of Corca Laoighe. These were kinsmen of the O'Driscolls. When the local dialect pronunciation of their Gaelic name was anglicized, in some cases the final"g" was retained, so we find the name appearing in records as Cowhig as well as Coffey. Their patrimony was the modern barony of Barryroe, County Cork, and their family strongholds were the castles of Dunocowhey, Dunheady, Dunowen, Dunmore, Duneen, Dunworley, and Dungoohey.

The Coffeys of Galway are historically connected with the O'Maddens and the tribe of Ui Maine. Their ancestral estates comprised the modern barony of Clonmacnowen, with the family seat at Tuam Cathraigh. They lost their lands and influence in the Cromwelliah and Williamite confiscations.

The Coffeys of Westmeath were for centuries one of Ireland's celebrated bardic families. Another family of Coffeys had their home in County Derry and find frequent mention in Irish annals through the number of eminent ecclesiastics which they gave to the church. Yet another Coffey family were Lords of Umhall in County Mayo.³

In the "Old Country", family records were kept, generation by generation, in the churches, or parishes. These records were limited usually to baptismal or marriage listings however, for either to be recorded, the party had to record his or her parents names, along with the day of the year.

These records have aided the compiler of <u>IRISH PEDIGREES, COFFEY</u>. BY O'HART. As an introduction to his listing of the Irish pedigree of the O'Coffeys, O'Hart had this to say:

"This family was dynasts or chief lord of the ancient territory of Corca Laoighe, now called Barryroe East and Barryroe West of the County Cork." "In Irish, the family name was O'Cobhthaigh; anglicised O'Coffey, O'Cowhig, and later Coffey, Coffy. Coffee, and even Doffy."

Beginning with Bile' and Ithe', brothers who ruled Munster, the stem of the Irish nation formerly Spain, we will proceed quickly as possible to the emigration of the Coffeys to America.

- Ithe', son of Breogan, King of Spain, the brother of Bile' was the ancestor of the Ithiaus; Ithe' was also the uncle of Milesius of Spain, and his descendants settled mostly in Munster. From Ithe' down to Cobhthaigh Fionn, are O'Coffeys of Munster.

EDWARD COFFEY Generation 1, in America

The first Coffey recorded in early American records is John Coffee, who emigrated from Ireland in 1637. He settled in Elizabeth City County, Virginia, however, there are no further records for him or his descendants. I am sure many Coffeys emigrated in the following years, but it wasn't until the year 1690, that Edward Coffey and his family first saw America.⁵

Based on information researched by the Media Research Bureau, we assume Edward to have been born in approximately 1650, and in approximately 1670, married Miss Ann Powell, daughter of Thomas and Mary Place Powell of Dinsdale. (for their personal pedigree charts, see page 100 in appendage #1.)

Another theory expressed is that Edward was born in 1670, came to America with his parents in 1690, and married in 1700 to Miss Powell.

We do know that in 1700, Edward and wife Ann Powell Coffey, were living in Essex County, Virginia. They were the parents of six children:

Edward's death took place some time before November 20, 1716 in Essex County, Virginia. Ann, his wife lived until the year 1726. John Coffey, son of Edward and Ann Powell Coffey, was born in approximately 1700, in Essex County, Virginia. He married Miss Jane (Jean) Graves, daughter of John and Hanna Graves, also of Essex County, Virginia (for Grave's family charts, see page 101 in appendage #1.)

The only information we have tracing the various moves of the John Coffey family, is the records of his land transaction, found in various deed books of the Virginia Archives.

Deeds Volume 23, page 276 Indenture July 15, 1745

"John Coffey and wife, Jane Coffey, of Spotsylvania County, Virginia to Silvanus Allen, of Essex County, Virginia, in consideration of 25 pounds current money, a parcel of land lying and being in the County of Essex and the Parish of St. Anne containing 100 acres, being part of a tract of 200 acres formerly called by name of Moseley's Quarter, and bounded, viz: beginning at the corner cak and maple in a branch of Gilson's run, and running thence N-W 126 poles to a stake, a corner between the sd. land and the land of William Ballard, thence N-E 132 poles to a corner red oak sapling standing by the plantation of Stephen Chenault, thence along a new made line S-E 126 poles to a hickory in the line of John Garnett, then along his line and the line of William Taylor S-W 132 poles to the beginning, together with all houses, woods, and under woods.

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John Coffey made his will on March 31, 1774, and died some time prior to March 1775, when his will was probated. No further information was found for Jane Coffey.

The last will and testament for John Coffey, as it appears in Albemarle County records, may be found on the following pages.

IN THE MAME OF GOD AMEN, this thirty first day of March and in the year of our Lord One thousand Seven hundred and seventy-four, I John Coffey of Albemarle County & parish of St. Annes in the Colony of Virginia yeoman. being weak in body but of perfect mind and memory thanks be given unto God. Therefore calling into mind the mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die do make and ordain this my last will & testament. That is to say principally & first of all I give and recommend my soul into the hands of Almighty God that gave it & my body I recommend to the earth to be buried in a decent manner at the discretion of my Executors, nothing doubting but at the general Resurrection I shall receive the same by the Almighty Power of God, and as touching such wordly estate wherewith it has pleased God to bless me with in this life I give & demise & dispose of the same in the following manner & form. Imprimis. I order that my just debts & funeral charges be first paid out of the whole. Item. I give and bequeath to my sons James Coffey & William Coffey to each of them five Shillings Sterling. Item. I Lend to my dearly beloved wife Jean Coffey (during her widowhood) the rest of my estate Real & Personal, and at the end of her widowhood to be equally divided among the rest of my children, viz: Thomas Coffey, John Coffey, Edmond Coffey, Rubin Coffey & Benjamin Coffey, Winifred Moran & Betty Field, and the above estate to be sold at the said term of time. Item. I order Thomas Coffey & Benjamin Coffey as my Executors & I do hereby disallow, revoke, and disannull all & every other former will & testament. legacies & bequeaths and Executors in anywise before named & bequeathed, ratifying and confirming this and no other to be my last will & testament.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal the day & year above written.



The first land entry for James and Elizabeth Coffey was for 115 acres of land in North Garden of Albemarle County, Virginia, purchased August 30, 1750. This land was held until December 13, 1764, when James bought 300 acres of land along the Tye River in Amherst County, for a consideration of 300 pounds. Here James and his family lived until about 1770.

James, being a convert of the Baptist beliefs, is said to have become a minister in the year of 1757. His concern for the pioneers of the newly settled wilderness of North Carolina, prompted his move to Surry County, North Carolina. He went as a missionary, and founded a church in the Mulberry Field sector of what is now Wilkes County. His church was a mere meeting house, and commonly called "Brother Coffey's Meeting House".⁶ Although this church was built and operated by the Baptist association, it was attended by many people of other protestant beliefs from the surrounding area, because they had no place of their own to worship.

Reverend James Coffey was a patriot during the American Revolution (1775-1881). His brother-in-law, Benjamin Cleveland, was a Colonel, commanding a regiment known as the "Wilkes County Bull Dogs". This regiment was composed mainly of family; All of James' sons except for Rice, Joel, and Lewis Russel, who were too young, served in Cleveland's regiment. Others included in the "Bull Dogs" were James' youngest brother. Benjamin, Robert Whitesides, and Mastin Durham, both sons-in-law of James.



The regiment of the "Wilkes County Bull Dogs", had only one main battle attributed to their name and that is the Battle of King's Mountain.⁷ At a time when the spirits were low elsewhere in the war, they were at an all time high with the North Carolinans.

Cornwallis, hoping to dampen the enthusiasm of the patriots, sent a force of British soldiers into the Allegheny Nountains. This regiment was fully equipped and lead by a British marksman, Major Patrick Ferguson. Major Ferguson sent word to the North Carolinans that the opposition to King George must cease. If not, he and the King's men would invade, hang the patriot organizers, make waste of their homes and in many other ways make recompense for their disloyality.

The North Carolinan frontiersmen were tough, and having the quick temper of their Irish ancestors, refused to take the Ferguson threat "sitting down". They organized near what is today Elizabethton, Tennessee, and under the leadership of Colonels "Isaac Shelby, William Campbell, *Jack Sevier, and Ben Cleveland, marched toward the Allegheny fortress. Their assignment....to break up the camp which had been nicknamed "King's Mountain".

Cornwallis, upon hearing word of the newly composed regiment of over 3,000 angry frontiersmen, heading in his direction, dispatched riders south to gather all available Tories to come to his aid; how-

ever his efforts were too late. The American frontiersmen had by that time, surrounded the rocky hill and begun their march to the top. With the woodsmen shouting to the top of their lungs, "Tarleton's Quarter", the battle began. Because of the element of surprise involved, Ferguson and a great majority of his men were massacred. By night fall, the victorious North Carolina Patriots, along with the 600 prisoners they had taken into custody, began their long march home.⁷ (For Benjamin and Reuben's personal account of this battle, see their applications for military pension on pages 112&115.

This battle became known as the strangest battle in the revolution in that the entire regiment was organized over night, and vanished from existence almost immediately after the King's Mountain episode.

Reverend James Coffey did not live to see the end of the American Revolution, as he died some time prior to October 1786. Elizabeth his wife, spent the remaining years of her life in Wartrace, of Bedford County, Teanessee, where she lived with her son Rice to age 100.

Several of these children settled in the Yadkin area of Wilkes County, North Carolina, however numbers 1,2,7, and 9 moved to the southern Indiana counties of Monroe and Owen.

Reuben, the 6th son of Thomas Coffey, was ordained into the ministry in February of 1815. For many years, he not only was the pastor of the Globe Mountain Church, but also served many of the surrounding churches of Wilkes and Burke Counties. He was the first moderator of the Catawba River Baptist Association, which was organized in 1827.

In 1832, Reuben and his family moved to Monroe County, Indiana and later on to Owen County, where they lived the remainder of their lives. Reuben built a schoolhouse alongside his home in Indiana in order to assure his children and grandchildren an education. He was a farmer, mechanic, gunsmith, maker of furniture, He is noted for making the castings for the first turning plow on wooden stocks in the state of Indiana. He received a patient signed by Andrew Jackson. Reuben, is possibly best remembered for being the founder of Franklin College, a Baptist institution in the state of Indiana.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF KENTUCKY


 Kentucky was originally a county in the state of Virginia, and was called Kentucky County. It's only inhabitants were
 Cherokee Indians, and trappers on hunting expeditions. The main reason no one else had ventured to this area, was the impregnable Cumberland Mountains.

It wasn't until May of 1779, that legal provisions were made to make a road through these mountains, and begin settlements in this area. In December of 1781, the road was opened and became known as the Wilderness Road.

The government began to entice people to "Go West" where farmland was rich, plentiful, and there for the taking. In order to give the needed incentive for some of the people to pick up and leave their homes, the government, under congressional acts of 1788, 1789, 1803, and 1806, awarded land grants to all veterans of the Revolutionary War. These land grants were awarded according to the rank held during their military service:

| Major | 1100 | acres |

Another type grant was the "Headrights" land grant. It re-

on the land a period of time, then file his claim at the nearest land office.

By 1792, Kentucky was admitted to the Union, and Wayne County was formed in 1800 from parts of Cumberland, Pulaski, and Whitly Counties. Wayne was the 43rd county and in 1801 it's county seat, Monticello, was formed.

LEWIS RUSSELL COFFEY Generation IV, child 11

Although Surry County, North Carolina had been frontierland when the Rev. James Coffey first moved his family there, by 1800, it had become as thickly inhabited as Virginia. ð

The war was now over, and our Coffey ancestors, being stifled by the set range of every day life, began to yearn for excitement. Reuben, James, and Mastin were all eligible for the military land grants. Their parents were dead, their families were young, so with nothing really holding them to North Carolina, one by one, they took advantage of the governmental offer.

Our first Coffey to move to Wayne County, was Lewis Russell, his wife Biddy, and their five children. Surpassing the main settlement, which was located at Parmleysville, Lewis and Biddy settled the east side of the mountain which was later to be called, in their honor, "Coffey Mountain". Lewis, took advantage of the Land Register Grants, and from the Wayne County Deed Book A, it appears that Lewis at one time owned much of Elk Spring Valley, (then called Coffey Valley). Their home, built about a mile from the foot of the mountain, marked the beginning of what was later referred to as the Coffey Settlement. The original log house still stands, encased in a weatherboard house belonging to Mr. Elmer Anderson. (house located off of highway #92, on #1258)

Joel and Patsy Coffey moved to Wayne County from Burke County, N.C. sometime after 1806. (their first deed was dated December 3, 1806). Joel is believed to have been a speculator of land as he purchased some 18 large parcels of land in the 20 years he lived in Wayne County. By trade, he was a carpenter, and was evidently thought highly of by his peers, as he was chosen by the court of Wayne County to build the county courthouse in the year 1825. Below are exerpts from the court orders dated May 1825 and June 1826:

The court a majority of all the justices being present do agree with and direct Joel Coffey the undertaker of the building of the courthouse to which the said Coffey agrees to raise what is called a four square roof upon the said courthouse in place of the roof now required and also a cupulo on said house to be of hight and size in proportion to the size of said house agreeably to the rule of good workman and to be finished by painting as is common in such cases on such building and the said Coffey agrees to make the said cupulo eight square of the commipions(?) request and the county court binds themselves and their successors to pay the said Coffey the sum of \$500.00 to be divided amongst the payments (\$1.50 per day in Commonwealth money for as long as the court may-sit, \$2.00 per day for as many a day as elections may continue.)

REUBEN COFFEY Generation IV, child 5

Reuben Coffey, born in Albemarle County, Virginia, September 16, 1759, was the founder of the Wayne County Coffeys, from which many of us are descendants.

From Reuben's resume. turned in for pension application purposes, we find that Reuben lived with his parents until age 20. On June 17, 1780, he volunteered for military service in the War of the American Revolution for "as long a period of time as my country needs me". He participated in the battle of King's Mountain and some small expeditions at Guilford, Hunting Creek, and Yadkin Hollow, in North Carolina. He was discharged in the fall of the year 1781.

Reuben received 103 acres of land in Wilkes County, North Carolina from his father's estate; this property was deeded November 15, 1795 (deed book C, page 164). This land, located on the Yadkin River, was held by Reuben until February 28, 1800, when he deeded it to his brother John Coffey, and moved to Burke County, North Carolina. It was here that Reuben raised his family of 10 children.

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James, Reuben's oldest son moved to Wayne County, Kentucky sometime in the year 1815 and Elizabeth, along with her husband Thomas Sumpter came shortly after. It is the general feeling that having 2 children and several brothers already established in Wayne County, prompted Reuben's mc/e at the age 71.

Reuben purchased his first 100 acres of land August 19, 1819 from Evans and Rebecca Wright for a sum of \$900. This land was located on the opposite side of the Coffey Mountain from his brother Lewis. The deed describes the land as being farm land, with the boundry meandering along Beaver Creek.

On October 30, 1830, Reuben bought another 25 acre tract of land adjacent to his farm and on September 25, 1834 he purchased a final tract of land from Johnson Wright, bringing his land up to the William Bartleson farm. The deed mentions that the land corners at a graveyard. We have found the small Bartleson graveyard on land above Beaver Creek, at Sumpter. Because the land in this area follows the description given in Reuben's deeds, here is where we believe the farm to have been located. (see map of Coffey Settlement)

Taking advantage of the new act of legislation, passed on June 7, 1832, providing pensions for all veterans of the American Revolution, with 6 months or more of service, Reuben and Mastin Durham, his brother-in-law made application in open court October 31, 1835. Reuben's application appears in appendage #2, page 115.

Reuben died June 9, 1842 in Wayne County as stated in excerpt from Court Order Book, B, page 348 May term Circut Court 1843.

Proof was this day made in open court by James Coffey his oath that Reuben Coffey, a Revolutionary Pensioneer of the U.S. departed this life on the 9th day of June 1842 leaving the following children to wit Eleanor Hisan, Betsy Sumpter, Sally Owens, James Coffey, Anna Owens, Rachael Elam, Polly Giddens, Naoma Wright, Oliver Coffey and Austin Coffey.

Reuben's last pension was paid by Rhodes Garthe, agent at Lexington, Kentucky, April 2, 1842, covering a period from September 1840 to March 4, 1842.

Because Reuben made no will, his estate was sold at auction with his son James and his nephew Henderson being appointed as administrators. A copy of this inventory may be found in appendage #2, page 125.

In this auction, Reuben's family Bible was sold to Washington Owens. For this reason, it has been literally impossible to gather birth, marriage or death dates for many of Reuben's children. We did find various bits of data for the following children:

Because no records were found to document these marriages, and because Reuben consistantly failed to mention his wife by name in deeds, court orders etc. always referring to her as "the wife" or Reuben Coffey and "wife" it is regretably that we have to omit this piece of information from the Reuben

Coffey chapter until some future date.


The two large tombstones missing from their foundations in the Coffey Cemetery in the Valley, are believed to have been the stones of Reuben and his wife. There has been however, a memorial stone, errected in the memory of Reuben, in the same spot.

THE COFFEY FAMILIES OF 1855

Many dangers faced the early settlers along the Wilderness Trail. There were still renegade Indians, unhappy with the treatment they had received during the American revolution, and made their restlessness known to the early military land grantees. Because of this unrest, the pioneers were required to carve their names or initials into the corner logs or on the chimney rocks of their cabins. This practice aided the officials in identifying casualties.

Even though many of the early Wayne Countians were hunters and trappers by trade, their families were still endangered by the wild animals that lurked in the forests. A hunting tale passed down through the Coffey family tells of the timberwolves that roamed through the woods, with an appetite for the early settlers. No one dared go out without their gun, and particularly when a timberwolf was sited. The menfolk would go out as a group, trap and destroy any of these wolves before giving the all-clear to travel once more. This tale tells of a pack of wolves. Because travel was done by foot, this pack not only was a hazard to the settlers, but also a nuisance. The menfolk in the families built a platform high off the ground, in a clearing, then returned to their homes to bait the trap. Each man soaked the soles of his shoes with meat renderings, then took his gun and proceeded to walk from all directions

to this platform in the clearing. When all the men were safely on top of the platform, they waited until nightfall. Their plan was successful, because it wasn't long till the animals, following the scented trail, arrived to their destination. Lighting their pine torches quickly, the men were able to shoot the whole pack without being in the slightest danger. Most likely each family handed to their generations to follow, similar hunting tales.

The pioneers, who were lucky enough to survive the perils of their newly inhabited land, were often caught up by still another threat....epidemics. Our Coffey ancestors were no exception.

By the middle 1800s, Reuben, Joel, Lewis, Martha Coffey Durham and their descendants, had thickly settled the Coffey Mountain, Elk Spring Valley area. Lewis Coffey's sons and their wives built homes scattered around his farm, forming what was known as the Coffey Settlement.


In the spring of 1853, Joshua Oatts, son-in-law of Lewis Coffey, became ill with "Congestive Typhus" (Typhoid Fever), supposedly contracted from their contaminated spring. Because Typhoid Fever was so contagious, neighbors kept their distance. This was not the case with Mrs. Polly Goddard, "Aunt Polly" as she was called. Mrs. Goddard went from her home, (which

is now the Mark and Fearl Burnett home) out to the Coffey Settlement and nursed the sick till their deaths^{*} Because they knew nothing of preventive measures, many of the family members contracted the fever. As a result, there were fourteen reported deaths, eleven of these in a ten month period of time. Dr. J. Frisbie, M.D. attending physician, recorded the following deaths:

The slaves were buried in a small grave yard in a grove of cedar trees across the road from Lewis Coffey's home. The family members were buried in the Coffey Cemetery, also on the original Lewis Coffey farm, (see graveyard listings on following pages.

JAMES COFFEY Generation V, child 4

James Coffey, oldest son of Reuben Coffey, was born in Burke County, North Carolina, some time in the year 1790. It was in Burke County that James married to Miss Sally Sumter, daughter of James Sumter, on July 7, 1810.

Henderson Coffey, cousin of James was already living in Wayne County, Kentucky, and had acquired much of the Lewis Russell farm. According to Mrs. Maggie Coffey Keith, great granddaughter of James, Henderson sent for James and his family to come to Wayne County, and help with the farming and cattle. It was approximately 1815, that James, Sally, and their 2 sons, Nelson and Lewis came to Elk Spring Valley to live.

James' new job consisted of burning off the Coffey land in the Rock Creek, Wolf Creek area, so that the grasses, and wild pea vines would be plentiful in the spring. When that was completed, he moved herds of Henderson's cattle there to graze.

After working in that area, James settled and took advantage of the Headrights act, being offered by the Commonwealth

of Kentucky, and on the 17th of December 1824, he received a 100 acre land grant located on the waters of the Big South Fork of the Cumberland River. It was here that the remainder of James and Sarah's 10 children were born.

October 30, 1830, James and Sally Coffey, sold their land in Elk Spring Valley, and moved to Flat Rock, Kentucky. According to Mrs. Maggie Keith, James and family moved to some unclaimed mountain land that he bought at a rate of \$1.00 per acre; there he ran wild horses and cattle, catching them in corrals and selling them in open market in the South.

After Sally's death, James lived with Elizabeth and Polly, his unmarried daughters. He died some time between the years 1870 and 1880 and was buried along side his wife in the Flat Rock Cemetery. Neither of these graves have markers

ELIGAH COLUMBUS COFFEY Generation VII, child 7

Eligah Columbus Coffey was born on the seventh day of December, 1843, in Rock Creek, Kentucky, a section located near the Wayne County line. Like his father before him, Eligah was a farmer and hunter.

Because he had such a small farm, he was forced to work away from home in order to make a living. For this reason, Eligah was a sympathizer with the North during the "War Between the States. The large land owners, who had slaves to do their work, had no use for hired hands, making employment a hard thing to find. Eligah was not old enough to serve in the earlier part of the war, however stood guard at the Henderson Coffey home, until the threat of looting and terrorism was over. One member of that household had already been shot through an upstairs window, by lawless guerrillas, who roamed the area, antagonizing family members of the soldiers. When reconstruction began and the country became a whole once more, the men were able to return to their homes.

It was on August 19, 1868 that Eligah married Miss Myra Emarine Freeman, b. January 9, 1852 to Eligah Freeman,

of Wayne County. To this union, three children were born.

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

I bequeath one heifer of two years old between Robertts Powell and Elizabeth Powell. I give to Thomas Powell one pair of leather brichis and one blue waist coat. I do give Gunto Nathenial Demost on Dair of Clath Pressbar & Coat

I do give anto Nathaniel Poweel one pair of Cloth Breeches & Serge <u>ITEM</u>: L'give unto my son, William Powell, the rest of my wearing clothes, whom I do appoint by these presents to see this my last will and testament performed and accomplished.

I do give unto Thomas Powell one Iron Pistle, and his brother, Nathaniel is to have the use of it as much as himself.

RESUME

I entered service of the United States in Burke County, North Carolina in year 1776 under the command of Col. Thomas Whitson, on the first of April commanding officer being Col. Joseph McDowell. We marched to the frontier of said county in North Carolina against the Cherokee Indians that were making inroads and doing mischief on the frontier to Crider's fort on Lower creek, being employed as scout. I was discharged in September moved from Burke to Wilkes County whre I resided until first of April, 1780. I then entered the service again as a volunteer under the command of Capt. John Barton, regiment commanded by Col. Benjamin Cleveland. I was some times employed in marching to divers places where it was understood Tories were embodied, sometimes in Wilkes County, sometimes in Burke--until I received orders to march to King's Mountain against some Tories and British collected there under the command of Major Ferguson. We marched on through Lincoln County in North Carolina under the command of Col. Benjamin Hearne and Col. Benjamin Cleveland until we were joined by the forces of Col. Campbell, Col. Shelby, Col. Sevier, and Col. Williams. There an action took place and Ferguson was killed and his men

There an action took place and Perguson was killed and his men defeated. I was not in the battle in consequence of losing my horse the night before and having to join the footmen under Col. Benjamin Hearne and the foot did not come up until the battle was over; on the American side Col. Williams was killed. I was then sent to guard the prisoners at Moravian town in North

Carolina during which march I was attacked with a pain in my ankles and was furloughed home the first of November. I never was out anymore.
