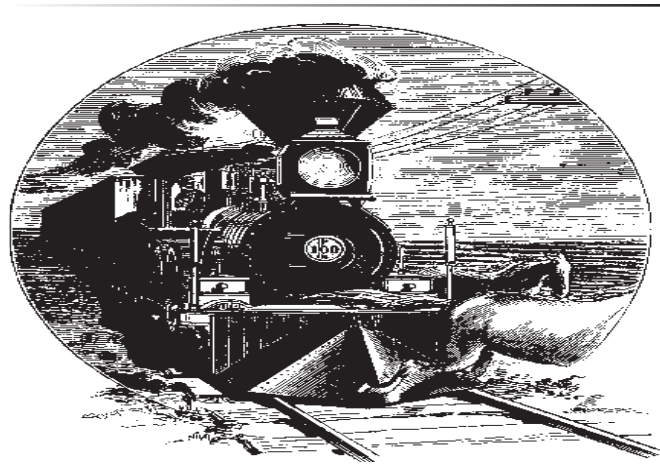

OBITUARIES**RICHARD "JACK" CRAWFORD**

Mr. Crawford died Saturday, Aug 27, 2005, Tyler, TX, following a long painful battle with cancer.

He was born May 30, 1917 in Way, MS, to Joseph Leon and Alma Johnston Crawford. He grew up in Tillatoba, MS, graduating from High School in Oakland and Northwest Mississippi Junior College at Senatobia, MS.

He was preceded in death by his parents, one brother, two sisters and son, Richard E. Crawford Jr.

He joined the Civilian Conservation Corps, serving one year in the Pocono Mountains of Pennsylvania. In 1941, he began a 30-year career with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, lower Mississippi Valley Division, Vicksburg, MS. Twenty-two years was on the Mat Sinking Revetment Unit being appointed chief Inspector and Project Manager. He was in charge of surveying crews preparing for Lake Ouachita near Hot Springs, AR all 1,060 miles of shoreline. His last eight years were spent in Monroe, LA managing the locks and dams on the Ouachita River. He retired Mar. 19, 1971.

Survivors include his wife of 39 years, I.V. Horton Freeman; two stepchildren, Dr. J. Chris Freeman and wife Shane of Tyler; Margaret Freeman Hubert and husband Charles of Huston.

Alvin T. Coffey, 78, of Monroe, TN died July 7, 2005 at St. Vincent Mercy Medical Center, Toledo. Born March 21, 1927, in Thorn Hill, Tenn., he was the son of Carter J. (Jack) and Mary Ann "Dutch" (Turner) Coffey. He married Ethel Davidson July 6, 1948, in Thorn Hill.

Mr. Coffey worked for Consolidated Paper Company in Monroe from 1948 to 1978. He served in the Army during WW2 from December 1945 until November 1947.

He was a member of Frenchtown Missionary Baptist Church. Surviving are his wife; two sons, Larry A. of Monroe and Boyd M. (Susan) of Temperance; a daughter, Brenda L. I sent a few pages of information and suggested that she try to get a copy of Marvin's book on Library Loan. Jessica expressed her appreciation and sent the following stories to share. She would also like to make contact with some more of her cousins at kjcoufal@cvtv.net.

Jessica writes; "I would like to share a story with you regarding my maternal g.g.g.grandmother Eliza Ann (Coffey) Wilkerson. We buried my g. grandmother Verna (Wilkerson) Sessom at the end of May 2005 it was in the family cemetery in Hext, TX on some old family land. One of my grandfather's cousins (a church

of Christ preacher), Neil told me, Momma was talking about having a hard time and grandma Coffey said, "I once had 4 of my babies corpses in 2 days, I know hard times." I have always heard from my g. grandmother about Grandma Coffey loosing 4 children and it is all recorded in the "History of Menard County" where I have read about it several times, but to hear a person tell her story was so real! Neil said that a man came through and offered to help on the farm and he brought the sickness with him, That's what it cost them.

One other fact that makes these people so interesting is that Eliza Ann Coffey Wilkerson's husband William Steven Wilkerson was a Confederate Soldiers and a prison guard. He became very close friends to one of his inmates. William Stanton. After the Civil War all of William Stanton's family was dead so he came to Texas to be neighbors with his friend William Steven Wilkerson (the prison guard). Years later, Levi Wilkerson son of (William Steven Wilkerson) married Mary Apiline Stanton daughter of (William Stanton).

(A side note) Just down from the family cemetery in Hext, TX is a sign that goes into a ranch that reads, "Coffee Cemetery --- -->," I drove down the road once but it seemed to go on forever and west Texas ranches can do that you know. So, I went back." Jessica Coufal

* Reams Goodloe, our Indexer, catches our mistakes. He says someone is in error. The descendants of James Coffey by Gene Brewington pp. 63, 64 says Mary Warden married Joseph Coffey, son of Henderson Coffey and gs/o Lewis Coffey. The KY historical document quoted in CCC # 99 p.5 and previously says Mary Warden married Joseph Coffey JR. The former does not give a date, but the age of Henderson's son would make it about the same as the 1859 date given for Jr. So it

is probable that they are talking about the same Mary Warden. The question now is, who is correct? If you know the answer, please send answer to Reams at: goodloev@bellsouth.net and include me Bonnie at bculey@aol.com

"Grainger County and its People",
1796-1998

Benjamin (son of John, grandson of Edward) sold his land in Wilkes co, NC Dec. 1808 and on Mar. 24 1809 purchased 200 acres on Big War Creek in what is now Hancock co, TN.

Others living nearby was: George Hayes, John Mills, Bennett Coffey, Thomas Coffey and Joel Coffey. Across the line in Grainger co., on Indian Creek lived Colby Rucker, John Coffey and George Coffey (and, in 1801, my ancestor, Reuben Dalton/Elizabeth Shockley, bought land on Indian Creek. That land, in today's geography, is not more than 1/2 mile NW of RT 131 just before it hits the county line.). All the above (except Dalton) had been neighbors in Wilkes County.

Everett Coffey did not know relationship of Joel and Thomas to Benjamin but did know they carried out business transactions for him in later years. Benjamin lived to be 84, died Jan 4 1834 and was buried near where John lived at the time.

Everett then listed the names of the children of John, George and Caswell.

Everett W. Coffey, assuming it is the same one, can be reached at 2676 Bullen Valley Road, Thorn Hill, TN 37881.

From the Dalton place, which is near Fairview, one looks NW around the end of War Ridge to Bald Point, into Hancock co. Continuing NW one reaches the Clinch River, which forms the border between Claiborne and Grainger counties. The Clinch and the Powell rivers are backed up to form Norris Lake but the Powell is across a considerable ridge or so it appears to me (Archie).

John and Elizabeth Rucker, (If I have the correct John) had land N of Clinch Mtn and NE of Thorn Hill and Elizabeth was charter member of Cedar Springs Baptist which is SE of the Dalton farm. Everett has the family Bible.

Some weeks ago, at Lillian Harrell's birthday party, I (Archie) met the latest John Coffey. When an earlier John Coffey went to the war of 1812 he carried his gunpowder in a gourd and that gourd has been handed down to each family "John Coffey" in turn, to present day. The Bible and the gourd, at the time of Everett's writing were one mile apart. Everett's book has some fascinating Coffey stories.

I remember in one of the books I have seen in the past it said that when Benjamin Coffey first came to Tennessee he settled in what was then Powell Valley, Hawkins County, TN near Ambrose Brewer.

MISSOURI LAND PATENTS

Land Patents: 1831-1910 The Secretary of State and Missouri State Archives for the State of Missouri announced the posting of the new database available at www.sos.mo.gov. GRAVES LINAGE

Archie Dalton of Jefferson City, TN ask what our source of descendency is for Jane Graves (d. 1792 Wilkes Co NC) Coffey, wife of John Coffey. My source is the Graves Family Newsletter by Kenneth Graves of Wrentham MA and

Marvin Coffey in his Supplement to James B. Coffey.. Vol 2 Ancestors. The dissertation in the Graves Newsletter is rather long so I will use Marvin's work.

" Kenneth Graves feels that the research of Sue Davis, formerly of Benton, AR is reliable enough to establish that Thomas Graves' son Francis had a son John by a first wife (name unknown). Francis later (bef. 1678) married Mrs. Jane Maguffey. John married Johanna (Hannah) and they were the parents of Jane (Jean) Graves who married John Coffey. Assuming the data collected by Sue Davis is correct, then the following would be the descent from Capt. Thomas Graves who came to Virginia on the "Mary & Margaret" in 1608 and settled in Jamestown.

1. Capt. Thomas Graves, b. abt 1580, md. Katherine Crosher
Children: John b. not later than 1616, Thomas, Ann, Katherine, Valinda, and Francis.

2. Francis was b. ca 1630, d. bef Aug 1691, md. 1st unknown, 1st child: John, b. 1675-78 (or earlier) d. 1720, md. ca 1698-1702 to Johanna

Children of John & Johanna: James, Benjamin, Martha, Ann and Jean (Jane), md. abt 1728 to John Coffey.

Francis Coffey md. 2nd to Mrs. Jane Maguffey who had previously been married and had children John and Jane and perhaps Elizabeth.

Children of Francis and Jane: Francis jr, Richard, and Thomas. Notes: Since Francis was about 48 when he married the widow Jane Maguffey, it was thought that this is rather late for a first marriage.

Jane Graves Coffey was listed in her father's will of 5 Sept. 1719, Essex co. VA.

Hope this helps. I can provide the Graves Newsletter story/theory if needed. BC

Petitioners prays your honor to grant Such order and decree in the persons and take Such further action there in as may be necessary to effectuate the prayers of petitioners to Sell Said lands herein before described for the purpose of division of the proceeds thereof among Said heirs. REV. JOHN THOMAS COFFEY

Coffey, Rev. John Thomas, age 75, was born March 19, 1915 passed away Aug 29, 1990. He professed faith in Christ and jointed the Oak Hill Baptist Church as a young man. Hello, Folks!

It's hard to keep a country girl down. I am ok. We had damages and/or destruction of all outbuildings but our home was untouched. Trees downed everywhere, we will need no firewood for years. Thank you for all your thoughts and prayers for our safety.

I know all see what's going on by watching the television. What I can say is that what you, the general, national public see, is NOTHING compared to what we locals see on our tv. We have one local station which is broadcasting live 24/7. Regarding New Orleans and surrounding areas we see where locals have filmed or taken videos that the national public does not see. So keep in mind what you see is only 1/100 of the horror which truly exists just 40 miles from here.

In my local area the electricity is spotty, my work place has power, two of the groceries have power as well as other places. There are ARMED men stationed inside and outside of the groceries. One has to stand in line to go inside and only x number of individuals are let in at any one time. No stop lights, all have become 4 way stops. Trees, power poles, thousands of power lines, all down. This is in my area. We had sustained winds of over 85 miles an hour for almost 9 hours with gusts to over 120 mph. Some of the crown molding in my home has shifted showing how much the house moved.

On a personal note, we do not have power at home and will not have for weeks I've been told. To

get gas you get in line and wait, sometimes over an hour, to get a \$20 limit of gas. I have heard that gas will be more plentiful by Tuesday here. At home to get water we drag the generator to the well pump and fill everything up we can, tubs, buckets, barrels, then drag it back to the house to run 2-3 times a day. We power up the ref and freezer. Dan's insulin has to stay chilled and naturally, until yesterday, there was no ice to be found. We live 17 miles from Hammond so are more isolated than some.

The heat isn't so bad as long as you don't move around too much. The nights are terrible. I've slept in the back of our Yukon for 6 nights and have plenty of insect bites to prove it. I also have found I can wash my hair using one cup of water to wet it and four cups to rinse it. Use less shampoo and of course, cold water rinses soap out better. Bird baths are the way to go.

We have filled the camper up with water and when I am ready we hook the generator to it and I get hot water showers. Now, if anyone there has taken a shower in a small camper you know there is no room and certainly no long showers. I am just grateful I have a chance to take a shower every other day. For food we are eating what thaws out next. I am so sick of grilled food but yet I watch TV and I see old people and children who have not eaten for 7 days and I have absolutely NO reason to fuss. I am grateful for all I have got now. This has been a morally humbling time for me, a life changing event.

This part of the state is going to be impacted for years to come. Our nation's economy will suffer because of these two disasters. Katrina was one and New Orleans survived it. The levee break was the second one and New Orleans became doomed because of that.

Here in Loranger and Hammond we are only affected by Katrina.

On a lighter note, I sit outside in the evening, waiting for dark. We have two "hurricane" lamps with oil and several candles. When it gets dark, we go to bed. When it gets light I get up. I use a latrine (translate, blue tarp over fence, sit on a bucket), I pull water from a 55 gallon barrel, I heat up the grill. Then I think of how my ancestors lived 150-200 years ago. They had the lamps and oil, candles. They had a latrine somewhere. They had a stove or campfire. My luxury is I have paper plates and plastic dinnerware, paper napkins whereas they didn't. I also now have washed our clothes out by hand, rinsed them and hung them to dry. I remember living much like this when I was a young girl. My grandparents didn't have an inside toilet and my gm cooked on an old iron cook-stove, used wood. We did have a washer that you cranked the side of it to make it agitate and then ran every piece of clothing through the wringers. We had running cold water until I was about 10, then got a water heater, then when I was 12 we moved to the city! Luxury galore! So, this experience isn't all that new to me. I have found I do like my "necessities" of life and miss them, but overall, I feel God has been good to me and my husband during all these recent events.

I will be checking email every day while at work. Thank goodness I do have a place to work. It makes my life surreal, coming from home where nothing is electric to work, where we have an inside bathroom, airconditioner, telephones!

Sheri Kelly in Louisiana

Hello again, (Sept. 6, 2005)

I actually am ok with everything in my personal life. Seeing what all is wrong with the rest of the area is tragic. We have people stopping in and calling, asking if we know how to get information on missing people. We are a retail furniture store 40 miles away. That shows how desperate people are. The customers we are having are all displaced. They are tired and most appear to have donated clothes on. Without exception all have purchased mattresses along with other furniture.

I have found that I can't endure the heat like I once could. I try to pick up debris each trip on my way to feed the horses or chickens, make every effort to do something constructive each step I make. There are people who have never had air conditioning. How spoiled I have become. I think I could handle the heat if we had electricity for fans.

Today gas is being rationed to \$40 per vehicle. It was \$20 two days ago so that tells me there is an increase in available gas for here.

Slowly stores and businesses are opening here in Hammond. I have heard there is about 40,000 new people here, all evacuees/survivors. One sees them just walking up and down the main road here. They have nothing except what FEMA or Red Cross, or a local charity has given them. How fortunate I am.

Still today, armed men in dark uniforms are outside our grocery stores and gas stations. I am appalled that

our own society has been so dehumanized as to rob, beat, rape, these people, and the worst part is, it is their own people. No one from Hammond or surrounding areas went to New Orleans and started shooting at rescue workers or cornering women in the Superdome and raping them. It is their own doing that. Because of the gangs and violence roaming around we all are having to be more cautious, careful, and have armed men watching. I know much of the violence has to do with the emotional and psychological aspect of the ones who have found themselves in despair but it is being fueled by only a few and has changed a 1,000,000 peoples way of life.

I appreciate everyone's concern for me and my family and all the prayers have worked. Dan is not feeling well but is maintaining as best he can, being his normal grumpy self. Me, nothing a long and hot shower with gobs of shampoo wouldn't fix. Like I told the others, I cannot complain about the trivial things in life anymore. By all standards we are wealthy now. We have a home, car, clothes, and I have a job. The poor people wandering around have a shelter somewhere, a Red Cross bag of toiletries, donated clothing.

I know there has been much ado about FEMA and the Red Cross. Let's point fingers AFTER the dust settles. These people left here and those shipped all over the country are without anything familiar. If they couldn't carry it in their pockets or a satchel, whatever they had, it's gone forever. Those are the people we need to help. Neither FEMA or the

Red Cross was prepared for this event, no organization would ever be prepared. We just need to help the best we can and where we can. I would suggest if anyone is considering donations, please check and see what local charity or church is trying to help these people and donate there. Let the money or clothing or food or diapers or tablet with pens and envelopes, stamps, whatever be sent where it needs to be sent. There will always be those who will rip off the system but if someone sees a need they can fulfill where they are, then do it.

If I could do without a job I would already be somewhere helping where I could. I have volunteered almost every Thanksgiving and Christmas to deliver donated food to locals and have badgered my boss for donations when I feel it's a worthy cause. It is in my nature (being the Southern girl that I am) to try to help everyone all the time.

OK, off my soap box for now. Thanks again for your concern. I most likely won't receive this issue of the CCC unless it's mailed first class so if you will, wait until I request it before mailing it. Our postal system most likely will not be working for weeks, months.

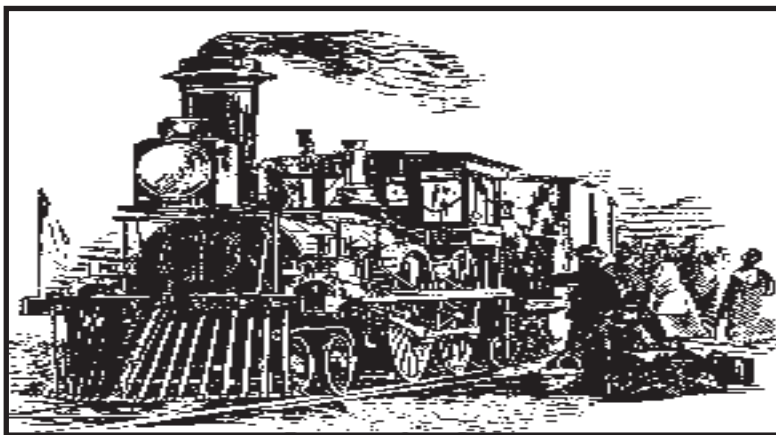
