FAKE EMAIL RISK TO CCC NEWSLETTER READERS?

You will be told "Visit the Coffey Genealogy Information Roadmap" to call up the new newsletter issue. Once there, you can click on 'Newsletters' and choose the latest issue. If you don't know or remember how to find the Roadmap, just reply to this note and say "send me instructions to find the Roadmap". I will send you a direct reply with instructions*.

THE ARCHIVESTICK:

By Fred Coffey: Readers may recall that in previous newsletters, I talked about seeking ways to preserve the many thousands of pages of Coffey genealogical information in our "Roadmap" application. We worked out that all our important data could be contained on a 16-gb USB flash drive. That could be offered to interested Coffey researchers. I call this the "ArchiveStick".

SEARCH TECHNIQUES USING THE "ROADMAP" (PART2):

In the previous newsletter, where I discussed "search techniques", I reported a "glitch" in the program used to research ECP name links. It reported that roughly 1000 of the links were "not valid". I said I thought I would be able to "fix the problem" – and I have now done so. And expanded the capabilities. Here is a discussion of background and of my updates:

The ECP (Edward Coffey Project) can be entered, in the way originally intended by Jack Coffee, at this link:

This entry page offers you four different tools that can be used to explore the ECP. When the ECP was a small project, all four worked nicely. But over time the ECP grew and grew and grew. In year 2020 Jack explained:

"The current edition of The Edward Coffey Project on USB contains 49882 people, 17564 families, 118458 events, 8072 places, 2561 sources, 62091 citations and 14534 multimedia items. It also contains over 20000 other documents and photographs."

Many ECP users just want to know if they have an ancestor (or cousin) who is in Jack's project. And if so, they want to look him or her up and see what can be learned. They probably have a name and other info (like dates) for at least one candidate.

- (1) The first option offered is to start clicking through the "<u>Descendants of Edward Coffey</u>". But if you don't already know the path of descent that can be impossible.
- (2) The second option is to look at the list of surnames. That can sometimes work, but many families are pretty big. For example, if you try the surname "Coffey", there are 10,503 people with that name (not counting 529 named "Coffee"). So that's almost impossible as well.
- (3) The third option is to look at "<u>Names A list of all the names on this site</u>". If you start to explore this list, you will see that each name references one or more "Narrative" links. And if you click on a narrative link, it will take you to the page in the ECP where that person is discussed. Each "Narrative" can tell you a great deal about each person!

But there are about 31,000 names in this list. And the way things are set up, the ECP can only show about 1200 names at a time. It takes 26 discussion pages to view all 31,000 names. You can start clicking and looking for the name you want, but it's a very tedious process.

I have now created an application that captures all 31,000 names in a single file. It allows you to choose a name you want to research. Then you can quickly locate all the "Narratives" that cover your chosen name. On the next page, I will post that application making it is accessible to everyone. Following is just a brief introduction:

The approach works with the 26 discussion pages. For each page we offer a one-line description of what can be found in each discussion section.

<u>Search Example:</u> Suppose I want to learn if my grandfather is in the ECP. I know his name and dates are Newton Coffey (1875-1969) A quick look at the discussion pages tells me that Index 11 is the discussion I want. Here's the description:

Index 11: From "Coffey" Mary Eleanor (1842-1909) to "Coffey" Norwood (1934-1934)

Everything is in alphabetical order. I can see in an alphabetical list that "Coffey Newton" comes after "Coffey Mary" and before "Coffey Norwood". So, I want to look at "F11" data.

On my Macintosh computer, I press "Command F" to do a search. (On other computer types, it may be "Control F"). then I enter "F11" in the search box and press "enter". And I will see the beginning of Index 11. (Note the name at the top of that entry page says all the people here are "Coffey".)

There are about 1200 names in this "File 11". The easy approach is to scroll down until you begin to find one with the first name of "Newton". Do that, and you will discover there are actually 14 such men as follows:

And there I can see my <u>Newton Coffey (1875-1969)</u>. Just click on the "Narrative" after his name, and you'll be looking at what was written about my grandfather! Here's a small part of the discussion for Newton – the small blue superscripts are links to supporting references.

Newton Coffey and Adelia Gertrude "Gertie" Robinson $\frac{24204}{}$ were married on 10 March 1897 in Cambria, Wayne Co., IA. $\frac{24205}{}$ They $\frac{24205}{}$ appeared in the census on 11 June 1900 in Clay Twp., Wayne Co., IA. $\frac{24206}{}$ They $\frac{24206}{}$ appeared in the census on 25 April 1910 in Clay Twp., Owen Co., IA. $\frac{24207}{}$ Newton and Gertie $\frac{24207}{}$ appeared in the census on 13 January 1920 in Clay Twp., Wayne Co., IA. $\frac{24208}{}$

And once you have found where ANYONE in your family fits into the ECP, you can begin to explore links to others in your family that "fit in". If I click on Newton's name at the top of his narrative page, it will "jump up" to his father. And you can do the same for his father's page, his father's father, etc. Or if you click on a blue name for one of his children, it will "drop down" to that person.

So, within a couple of minutes, you can find the ECP report for any of the 31,000 names in the ECP list. And then start exploring things about other members of that person's family.

READY TO TRY OUT THE "NEWIMPROVED" SEARCH TOOL?

WHAT WAS THE ECP FAMILIES MOST POPULAR FIRST NAME?

Here's a challenge for any new users experimenting with above application. Jack Coffee reported his ECP had 10503 people with the "Coffey" surname. What was the most popular "first name" among the Coffey men? My best guess is that it may be "James".

I went to the above search tool and told it to look for "James Coffey". And I found there are 363 "James Coffey" men.

Your challenge: Pick your favorite ancestor's first name and see how many there are. Maybe John Coffey? Or William? Or Robert? Or for females, try searching for Mary Coffey? (This is only showing the women BORN with the Mary Coffey name.)

FINDING LEONARD N COFFEY FAMILY:

<u>Fred:</u> I got a message from FTDNA that Joseph D Coffey had joined the Coffey DNA Project.

<u>Joe:</u> I am the brother of Leonard N Coffey. I decided I was ready to use DNA to explore my ancestry. Some years ago, I got a DNA test on Ancestry.com, and I'm looking for your suggestions on how I could do more.

<u>Fred:</u> You, being a brother of Leonard and having an interest in a DNA test, offered potential for THIS newsletter story. Leonard died in 1989, and no Coffey DNA testing was done until it was reported in Newsletter Issue #93 (December 2003).

Leonard was the founder and first publisher of the Coffey Cousins Clearinghouse newsletters. He was highly involved for the first 8 years of our 44-year research efforts. Look at the letterhead on this newsletter. I did a quick search for background on his family and found this. It names you (Joseph) as one of his survivors:

Tuesday, Jan. 31, 1989 Indianapolis Star and News

LEONARD N. COFFEY MARTINSVILLE, Ind. — Services for Leonard N. Coffey, 58, will be at 2 p.m. Wednesday. Coffey, a Korean War Navy veteran, died Sunday. A machine operator, he worked for Hopkins 8. Woods Co. at Martinsville. He was founder of Martinsville High School Alumni Organization and editor of Its publication. The Survivors — wife Donna Smith Coffey; daughters the Rev. L. Susan May, Terry J. Coffey, Bonnie Coffey-Meyers; mother Mildred Leonard Coffey; brothers Donald G., <u>Joseph D.</u> Coffey; four grandchildren.

Joe: Here is the link to my family tree on Ancestry.com:

<u>Fred:</u> Your tree shows multiple generations going further back in time from Edward Coffey Senior. At one time Coffey Cousins Clearinghouse researchers thought they knew something about such generations. We now firmly believe we do NOT know the name of ANY ancestor before Edward. All of these should be deleted. (We do know some things about deep ancestry, but there are NO known names.)

Starting with Edward, your tree has this for the first 5 generations:

The first 4 generations here would have been a good guess at the time Leonard Coffey was alive. And all generations from (5) Lewis Moses Coffey down are 100% in agreement with the Coffey Cousins current view. But since that time there has been substantial research. For example, we are now quite convinced that (4) Ambrose is NOT part of your line. And there are several other things that we no longer believe. Let me DISCARD these first four generations, and offer what we NOW believe to be more correct, and then explain what has been learned:

Joseph's tree is identical for recent ancestors from (5) <u>Lewis Moses Coffey</u> on down. But after considerable study, we now believe that Edward's daughter <u>Annister</u> is part if the picture. It has long been known that daughter Annister had a son, out of wedlock, that she named <u>James</u>. And we confirmed via DNA that the father of James was named <u>James Samuel</u>. This places a non-Coffey male ancestor in the descent. Any male line y-DNA test will now show "Samuel" DNA. That would include Joseph D Coffey.

Here's a "tool" you may find interesting. You can click on the "Narrative" for each of these people. And it will take you to whatever pages in the ECP (Edward Coffey Project) that discuss that person:

Joe: Now, what would you recommend for further DNA testing?

<u>Fred:</u> If you do further DNA testing, it needs to be a y-DNA test, rather than the autosomal test you did on Ancestry.com. I would recommend doing FTDNA's 37-marker y-DNA test for \$79. I think it would also be useful to include their Family Finder test. Purchased separately that would cost \$39. But if you order the two tests as a bundle, the cost will be \$109.

I'm pretty sure I know what will happen with the 37-marker y-DNA test. It will show you have matches to "Samuel" families, and no match to "Coffey".

On the other hand, the Family Finder will likely show some Coffey matches, but probably no Samuel matches. Your "y-DNA" is Samuel, but you have only a tiny bit of Samuel in your overall DNA mix.

FTDNA's "Family Finder" is exactly the same as the DNA test you did on Ancestry. But each tester is comparing to just their own database. More "Coffey's" are tested on FTDNA, and there should be more matches.


If you are not comfortable understanding DNA tests, I can offer some quick reading material.

On the following page, I will show a different display you may find interesting:

The following starts with your and Leonard's great great great great great great great (i.e. 6G) Grandfather Edward. And the left column then shows your biological descent from your 5G Annister and James Samuel. And goes down from there. And the right column shows my (Fred) own descent from Edward. And shows how each of my descendants are related to to you and Leonard:



Now I will skip a few generations, and show how these end up with Leonard and myself.



And this concludes that Leonard and I are seventh cousins.

UPDATING THE ECP WITH NEW INFO:

In the last newsletter I addressed a concern that Bonnie Culley had about "Ausburn/Ausborn/Ausborn/Osborn" Coffey. If I had used the new searching tool, I would have seen the following names and Narrative links, related to this family:

That would have been enough to convince me that I needed to read EACH of the Narrative links to understand how they all fit together. In that reading, I found that the second name above had a wife "Martha Campbell", and that Jack Coffee knew none of Martha's dates or supporting facts.

The ECP is a very powerful tool. But be aware that I and others sometimes find better sources of information versus what Jack knew for the ECP. And I often use such updated info in these newsletters. I went to Ancestry.com public member trees and gave it data on names and dates. And I found that Martha had researched this family in great detail. Martha was found in 139 trees on Ancestry.com. The following shows in red and green the new information.

BRENDA'S CONFUSING FAMILY:

FROM BRENDA:

My name is Brenda Pair, Laird. I have been researching my Coffey relatives and am confused as to the two 1)Eleanor Limilia Coffey, Spouse: Fredrick Hisaw and 2) Eleanor Lemilia Coffey daughter of Pvt Reuben B Coffey and Mildred Morris. Is this a mistake in genealogy research? Ancestry research shows 1) Eleanor's father as John D Blueford Coffey and Jane Graves, but I can find no official records substantiate this claim. From me my ancestry is Brenda Pair, my father, Carlos Oliver Gene Pair, Ollie May Wright, Vonnie Elizabeth Tittle, Frances "Fannie" Matheldia Frost, Melvina V. Clyde Pendley, Pernetta Ellen Hisaw, Eleanor Lemilia Coffey, PVT Reuben B Coffey, (hope this is correct) REV James E Coffey, John D Blueford, Edward Coffey Sr., John Hugh Coffey, Hugh James Coffey Jr., Hugh Coffey. Beyond this I need to research. From Joel Absolom Hisaw, Spouse: Eleanor Lemilia Coffey my line splits to Fredrick Hisaw, Highsaw and Eleanor Limilia Coffey, (Not sure about this) John Blueford Coffey and Jane, Jean Graves. I did DNA through Ancestry and am descendant by Through Lines and the DNA matches. Can you help me? Sincerely.

FROM FRED:

I can help a bit with the "Coffey" part of your family. But after digging a bit, I am probably as confused as you are! There are tremendous complications!

I am quite involved with "Coffey" genealogy and regularly write articles for the "Coffey Cousins Clearing House" newsletters. You raise some interesting questions, and I am writing about our discussions now. I am starting by showing your note above. But I normally only write about "Coffey" topics. In your note I have highlighted in GREEN parts that have nothing to do with my Coffey family. Once the newsletter is finally published, it will become public information. If you are concerned about making any of this public, let me know and I will delete the GREEN parts.

I have also marked in blue, with a strikeout mark, your reference to three ancestors of Edward Coffey. For a while the "Coffey Cousins" thought these names were ancestors. But we then proved that was incorrect. You should delete those names from your files – they are NOT Coffey Cousins.

(And for privacy reasons, I deleted your email address. If any readers offer ideas or comments, I will forward to you.)

Following is what I would include as your Coffey ancestry:

We have a very large, and carefully researched, database for descendants of the (1) Edward Coffey above. The work was done by Jack Coffee (now deceased) and he called his work the Edward Coffey Project (ECP). We also do analysis for any family with the name "Coffey", many of which are quite unrelated to Edward. The intro to this newsletter offers a link to what we call the "Coffey Roadmap" that helps you find your way through everything we know. For the moment, just trust me.

Here is a step-by-step process that will help you read all that we know about your ancestry:

Go to this hyperlink, which will take you to the common entry to the ECP:

Then follow this procedure:

- (1) Click on <u>Descendants of Edward Coffey</u> That will take you to a lengthy discussion about Edward Coffey. Read or print as you wish.
- (2) Then scroll down the "Edward" page, looking for to the blue names of Edward's children. These are hyperlinks to the narrative sheet for each child. Click on <u>John Coffey</u>. That will take you to a lengthy discussion about John.
- (3) Look down John's page and click on the child Rev. James Coffey. Ditto.
- (4) Look down James' page and click on Reuben Coffey. Ditto.
- (5) Look down Reuben's page and click on *Eleanor Lemillia Coffev*.

This last page is particularly important to your understanding. It references this note to Jack Coffee:

Susan Currell Hollis, Littleton, Colorado.

"I published the Hisaw Family newsletter for eighteen years and I know quite a bit about this family. My mother's maiden name was Hysaw. I have come upon the proverbial 'brick wall' as I try to find the Hysaws before they appear in Rockbridge Co., Virginia in 1778-79, so I am now spending more time looking into the Coffeys and Israels, also the Pendleys...neighbors and presumed 'friends and relations of the Hisaws' in the hope I can 'get a clue' as to when they came to America. Again, thank you for putting all this wonderful information into the public domain."

(Memo from Fred: I did a quick search on "WhitePages.com". I think this may be Susan C Hollis, 6411 S Quay Ct, Littleton, CO 80123. She is 78 years old, born Aug 15, 1947. I sent you her reported phone number.

So, Jack is explaining that he is not personally researching the family of Eleanor Lemillia Coffey. And this is the end of what I can personally offer you about your family.

Then I thought I could be helpful, if I went to Ancestry.com and looked at their "Public Member Trees". But there are about 2000 such trees that claim to know the ancestry of this Eleanor. I looked into several of them and found they were all over the place.

Jack Coffee, the researcher behind the ECP, refused to look at Ancestry tree data, because most of what he saw posted there was undocumented garbage. I'm slightly less negative, and there are some properly documented Ancestry trees out there. But I don't have the patience to search through 2000 trees trying to find a few good ones.

I think your best bet right now is for you to try to contact Susan C Hollis and see if she can point to one that meets her standards.
