

SOLDIER'S APPLICATION FOR PENSION.

STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA,
COUNTY OF Nashua,

On this 5th day of July, A. D. 1909 personally appeared before me, C. S. C. in and for the State and county aforesaid, William C. Coffey, age 72 years, and a resident at Forsyth, N.C. postoffice, in said county and State, and who, being duly sworn, makes the following declaration in order to obtain the pension under the provisions of an act entitled "An act for the relief of certain Confederate Soldiers, Sailors and Widows," ratified March 8, 1907, that he is the identical William C. Coffey who enlisted in Co. E — 58th Reg. N. C. State Troops, on or about the day of 1862 to serve in the armies of the late Confederate States, and that while in said service at near Greensboro N.C. in the State of N.C., on or about the day of 1864, 1865, he received a wound or wounds, etc.

(Applicant will here state the nature and extent of his wounds and disability, so that a proper classification can be made under the new Pension Law passed by the General Assembly of 1907. Read and section of said law carefully, and to accomplish the classification therein called for let statement here as to nature and extent of wounds, disability, etc., be very full and explicit.)

In left finger & right thumb.

I also received a severe injury in the right side by a piece of a bullet shell which was almost fatal and ever since I was hurt this was during the Chancellorsville battle.

He further states that he is, and has been for twelve months immediately preceding this Application for Pension, a *bona fide* resident of North Carolina; that he holds no office under the United States, or under any State or county, from which he is receiving the sum of three hundred dollars as fees or as salary annually; that he is not worth in his own right, or the right of his wife, property at its assessed value for taxation to the amount of five hundred dollars (\$500), nor has he disposed of property of such value by gift or voluntary conveyance since the 11th of March, 1885, and that he is not receiving any aid from the State of North Carolina or under any other statute providing for the relief of the maimed and blind soldiers of the State.

Headlyes, who resides at Mooresville postoffice, in said county and State, a person whom I know to be respectable and entitled to credit, and being by me duly sworn, says he is acquainted with William C. Coffey, the applicant for pension, and has every reason to believe that he is the identical person he represents himself to be, and that the facts set forth in this affidavit are correct to the best of his knowledge and belief, and that he has no interest, direct or indirect, in this claim.

Also personally appeared before me Dr. J. M. Headlyes, a physician in good standing in said county and State, and being duly sworn, says that he has carefully and thoroughly examined William C. Coffey, the applicant for pension, and finds such disability for manual labor as is described below by reason of wounds received while in the discharge of his duty as a soldier or sailor of North Carolina in the service of the late Confederate States.

(Let physician here give full and explicit professional information as to the nature and extent of wounds, disability, stating particularly whether disability amounts to three-fourths or not, in order to accomplish the classification called for under the new Pension Law passed by the General Assembly of 1907.)

I have examined said C. Coffey and find him to be in general poor health, trouble with heart and palpitation, difficulty in respiration, was done up with opium, salt water, sugar, ginger, tobacco and spirit of wine, congested liver, not able to stand up for days, weak, feeble, etc.

We certify that we have carefully examined the application of William C. Coffey
for a pension under the provisions of an act entitled "An act for the relief of certain Confederate Soldiers, Sailors and Widows,"

from any other source from the State of North Carolina, and therefore his application is correct and just under the act.
