CHAPTER ONE

HISTORY

James Thomas Coffey was born March 15, 1840 in the parish of Caltre, County of Gallway near Dublin, Ireland. Little is known of his parents except that they were small scale farmers in Ireland. They died when James was quite young.

James came to the United States an orphan in 1850. He had three brothers, Thomas, Michael, and Patrick. Also, two sisters, Ellen and Mary. It is believed that Thomas came over here before the rest for there is some evidence that he was already settled in New York state when James came over here. We also know that James, Patrick, Ellen and Mary came over at the same time. There is no record as to when Michael came over.

Thomas married but separated because of religious differences. There is no record of any children.


Michael Coffey settled in Illinois and had two children, Mary and Ebbon.

Patrick lived at Parma, New York and was a farmer. He had seven children: Lizzie. Teressa, Georgie, Nellie, Willie, Dannie, and Johnnie.

Ellen married Adrian Foster, a watchmaker at Elgin, Illinois. She had two sons, Walter and Will, and one daughter, Marion. After the death of her husband, she moved to Kansas City to make her home with her son, Will.

Mary married Henry Tempelton and they moved to Colorado Springs, Colorado and had eight children; James Henry, Willie Edgar, Sarah Ellen, Mary Harriet, John Cassins, Emma Luella, Lenora Edna, and Cora Agnes.

Very little is known of the early life of James Coffey. When he came to live with his brother, Tom, in New York state, he was eleven years old. A little later he went to work for

a dairy farmer for his keep. He had to work from early morning till late at night. After he grew older, he received some compensation. The first years wages he received was a suit of clothes. After that he would receive a horse or something like that for a year's work.

Little is known about how or when he came to Illinois. It is known that at the age of twenty-one on August 15, 1861 he enlisted in Co. C of the 33rd Volunteer Infantry of Illinois from Randolph's Grove. He was mustered out in October 1864. His company was activated on August 15, 1861 and on October 5th of the same year they saw their first action near Pilot Knob, Missouri, eighty-six miles south of St. Louis. Co. C saw action up and down the Mississippi from St. Louis to New Orleans.

One of the most cursed campaigns of the war according to the memoirs of Co. C was a trip from New Orleans on the sea going steamer "Clinton" to Brazos, Texas. The men were all loaded on the upper deck with scarcely room to move about while their horses, wagons, and supplies were on the lower deck. During this voyage, some very rough weather was encountered with the resultant sea sickness among all the men and severe damage to equipment, while their horses were all stoved up and ruined. To make this trip even worse, Capt. Baxter ran his ship aground on three different occasions nearly losing his ship to the storm each time.

It was during this Texas campaign that James Coffey transferred from the 33rd Illinois to the 99th Illinois on January 26. 1864. Because of this transfer, he lost his corporals rating which he had held since being promoted on December 21, 1861.

During the Civil War, he participated in many battles. Most noted of which are Vicksburg. Champion Hill, Black River Bridge, and Fredwicktown. He was never wounded but was sent north on account of illness on August 8, 1863. He

had recovered and rejoined his Co. in time to make the despised boat trip to Texas.

It is interesting to note that Co. C's historian says of that company's organization, "No special class of men were chosen. Farm boys, mechanics, clerks, students, and others made up the company but some preference was given men with education. There were few indeed who could not read and write". He was given an honorable discharge in October of 1864, returned to Illinois and started farming near Bloomington, Illinois.

There he met Mary E. Rhoades who had been born in Ohio on November 12, 1844 and had moved to Illinois with her parents when she was about fifteen years old. They were married at the bride's home on the 13th day of February, 1867 by Rev. S. Bishop in the presence of David and Margaret Rhoades, the bride's parents.

To this union ten children were born, nine in Illinois and one in Nebraska. They are as follows:

One son, Frank Milton, died in Bloomington, Illinois at the age of one year on September 22, 1873.

In the spring of 1885 James Coffey heard the call of the West, loaded up his wife and eight children and came to Fillmore County, Nebraska. In December of the same year, he moved on to Furnas County, Nebraska where he settled on a farm three miles southwest of Stamford. It was here that their last child, George Marion, was born on January 7, 1887.

When he purchased the farm, it was known as Cassbrook, which was the local post office. There was a slot in the front door for people to drop their mail in if no one was at home. The house was a log house and the only other building on the

place was made of native cotton wood lumber. The lumber had been nailed up green and was so twisted and warped as to make the building useless. It was here that they carved a beautiful home and larinstead on the banks of the Sappa Greek out of raw prairie.


His wife, Mary, became ill with creeping paralysis in 1891. Her condition grew steadily worse until Sunday morning, April 21, 1895, she died. He organized his family around Mary Ellen, affectionately known as "Nellie" by everyone. She remained with her father helping him rear his family until the fall of 1909. When her father purchased a pair of sox from a peddler, a common practice in those days, he wore a blister on his heel and was poisoned by the dye in the sox. He died of crysipelas on October 2, 1909. He and his wife are buried in the Deaver Cemetery near the old homestead. Their pictures appear on the cover of this book.

CHAPTER TWO

SKETCHES

MARY ELLEN (NELLIE) COFFEY

Nellie was 18 years old when the burden of her dead mother's duties fell upon her capable and loving shoulders. She never married but spent her entire life in the service of her family. After her mother's death and until the death of her father, she remained at home caring for her father and brothers. At

the time of her father's death, all of the brothers were married with the exception of George and babies were arriving with surprising regularity. It was Nellie who came to help out when the babies arrived.

Nellie spent the rest of her life making her home with which ever brother needed her, wherever there was sickness or

a new baby coming or an emergency around the house, you could count on Nellie taking over in her very capable way. She does not have a niece or a nephew who has not curled up on her lap, had her bandage a sore toe or finger, romped with her in the yard, had her scrub their neck and ears and do the thousand and one things that must be done for a growing child. She was loved as a mother by each and every one of her nieces and nephews. She was loved as a sister by each and every sister-in-law. She will always be remembered for her hearty laugh, her love to tease and be teased and her complete unselfishness. Nellie never married, vet she lived the most useful life of any woman of her time.

When her final illness came, she was bedfast for eight weeks. Her love and loyalty was partially returned and a testimony to the love that the "family" felt for her, was given by the way they rallied to her aid. They left their homes, their businesses, their farms, their jobs, taking turns setting up with her. Someone of the family was with her constantly until she passed away on April 11, 1949. She is buried beside her father and mother at the Deaver Cemetery near the old home place.

JAMES THOMAS (JIM) COFFEY

Jim, the oldest of the family, started working as a school teacher but soon went back to the farm. He settled on a farm 6 miles west of Stamford, where he remained until he retired and moved to Beaver City. He raised a family of two boys and two girls. He had the unique distinction of serving as superintendent of Sunday Schools for the United Brethren Church at Hollinger. Nebraska for a period of 40 years. He was a very religious man but never tried to force his religion on any one else. After his first wife died and his health started to fail, he remarried and moved to Portis, Kansas where he died from arthritis. He is buried at the Turner Cemetery near Hollinger, Nebraska.

CHARLES EDWARD (CHARLEY) COFFEY

Charley worked at the Stamford mill for four years, then moved to a farm about one mile west of the old home place. Here he farmed for eleven years. He then moved to Beaver City and ran a grain elevator for vears. He raised a family of two boys and two girls and he is now in semi-retirement operating a service station with one of his sons. Charley has been active in local government in Beaver City and Furnas County. He is probably best known for his mischievous chuckle and year round good humor. He truly believes in, "keeping the sunny side up". He is never happier than when surrounded by his friends and kidding each other.

JOHN WESLEY (JACK) COFFEY

Jack has always lived on the farm which he now owns, two miles north of Stamford. While the boys were still at home, Jack operated a sorghum mill in connection with his farm. He raised a family of five boys and was a supporter and pillar of the Presbyterian Church of Stamford, Nebraska. Jack will probably be best remembered by his Irish wit, his hearty laugh, sunny disposition and a particularly close comradeship between he and his boys. Since the death of his wife, he is living alone on his farm north of Stamford.

BENJAMIN FRANKLIN (BEN) COFFEY

Ben started out to be a railroad engineer. Upon learning that he was unable to pass the examination because of a bad eye, he returned to his father's farm five and one-half miles north-west of Stamford where he farmed for a number of years. He later moved to a farm three and one-half miles southeast of Stamford. He raised a family of six boys. Ben was the largest of the Coffey boys. He was a great kilder and always ready for a good time.

I recall that a street carnival had set up in Stamford with a wrestling bear. Ben was induced to wrestle the bear and managed to throw it. His son, the writer, was probably the cockiest kid on the streets of Stamford that night. Ben was afflicted with arthritis the last few years of his life. He died of a brain hemorrhage and is buried at the Deaver Cemetery.

WILLIAM HENRY (BILL) COFFEY

Bill farmed the old home place for years, later moved to the farm just south of the home place. Sometime later he purchased a farm one mile west of the home farm where he still lives. His family consisted of one son, having lost several children in infancy.

Bill like Sam, was a great lover of good horses. However Bill also liked to use mules and in the early days developed quite a liking for the tough ornery little western horse which was captured on the plains and sold to the farmers.

Bill was a pillar in the Bethel Church south of his home, and still lives alone in his farm home nestled among the cottonwoods of the Beaver Creek.

SAMUEL JAY (SAM) COFFEY

Sam started farming about two miles north of Stamford in 1900. He moved to the Thompson farm one mile east of Stamford in 1913. He lived there for a number of years and then purchased a farm on the east edge of Orleans. He raised a family of three girls and two boys.

Sam was a great lover of good work horses. His horses were always the "show horses" of the neighborhood. He took great pride in these horses. I never saw one of his horses that was not as fat as a butter-ball.

By nature. Sam was the serious studious type with an in-

fectious grin. When the occasion demanded, he would surprise you with his wit and humor. He died of a heart attack and is buried at Orleans.

ARTHUR ROBERT (ART) COFFEY

Art started farming four and one-half miles northwest of Stamford. After a few years, he moved to the Charley Coffey farm a mile west of the old home place. He lived here for a number of years, then purchased a farm about midway between Edison and Beaver City, Nebraska where he lived the rest of his active life. He raised a family of one girl and three boys. Art was extremely friendly with an infectious grin and a sunny disposition. He was a good mechanic as well as farmer.

About a year before his death, he lost his left leg because of a bone cancer. His affliction at no time affected his sunny disposition. At the last family reunion which he attended his stock answer to the question, "How are you, Art?" was a wide grin and "I can't kick". Art died of cancer about six months later. He is buried at the Deaver Cemetery.


GEORGE MARION COFFEY

George, the youngest of the family, developed asthma as a young man. He could not stand the climate in Nebraska and went to Montana for his health. When he was twenty-two years old, he arrived in Lewiston, Montana about the time that country was being broken up and secured a large steam engine and a seven-bottom gang plow: with this machinery, he broke up and planted hundreds of acres in Montana. The customary fee for this work was the use of the land for three years.

George later drifted into the mechanical line and is still following that vocation in Ronan, Montana. He married late in life and has no children.

CHAPTER FOUR


TWICE TOLD TALES

Times must have been lively and the pranks rough when that group of eight boys and one sister were growing up judging from some of the stories that you hear the second generation tell on each other. There was a tree at the bottom of the hill, Jim ran the end of that tongue square into the tree bringing the cultivator to an abrupt halt and sending Charley catapulting through the air. This ended the rides.

Ben. Sam and Art were farming the north place which was some 5 miles from the home place, so they were batching in the sod house. Ben was elected to be the cook over his protests. He finally agreed to cook but only on the condition that the first man who complained was automatically the cook from then on. One evening Ben had prepared beans for supper and put in altogether too much salt. Sam took the first bite threw back his head and roared. "Good Lord, these beans are salte". Then realizing what he had said added. "But that is just the way I like them". Ben always swore that those two boys ate all those beans rather than be stuck with the cooking. Sam and Art swore Ben added the salt to get out of the cooking.

Grandad had gone into the General Store in Stamford; there he met a drummer who had heard of Grandad's large family and asked him how many children he had. Grandad's lrish wit made him reply. "Fight boys and each of them have a sister". The drummer was full-bergasted thinking he had saveen children instead of nine.
















There were a couple pairs of boxing gloves in the family that got their share of exercise. Regardless of the weaters and the promises made to each other about tapping lightly, there was invariably one hard tap that called for more and harder ones.

Jack and Sam had been having their bout that started out in the manner described. They had come to the hard and harder blows which weren't enough. They wanted to finish it up without the gloves but the rest of the brothers made them keep the gloves on until their Irish ceased to boil.

This same pair of gloves went on exhibition before a Stamford crowd one evening with Art and Will manipulating them. They went through the same promises and figured they were playing the goat at the best so why torture each other. Art over-tapped and Will got a bone in his nose cracked. Will was ready to box by then and if the string hadn't dislodged itself out of the gloves and given Art a gouge in the eye, there might have been an exhibition.

The book "Ten Nights in a Bar Room" had somehow gotten into the Coffey library and had made its rounds for reading material.

One day in their father's absence. Will and Ben decided to re-do the javelin act as related in the narrative. They got the stage all set, butcher knives a plenty and Nellie for the target, spending much time placing her against the wall and putting her arms just so.

Everything was in readiness for the act when a neighbor lady came bolting in without knocking. The boys just melted out and never did find out just how accurate they might have been.

George and Artic had been sent on an errand to the neighbors. George had been told to wash and cleap up and put on a different pair of overalls as the ones he was wearing had a hole in the seat of them. He thought that considerable trouble and reasoned it out that he could walk into the neighbors home and back out. No one would notice the place the patch should be. He made it in O. K. and faced everyone and almost out but missed the door a few inches and sat down in a slop pail that was parked there. He turned around—hole in the trousers, slop and boy and made his exit. He beat it home and no doubt put on the clean overalls without a word of encouragement.

* * *

On the old Coffey farm in early days was about the only ice-house in the country. The whole family of boys (married and at home) would fill it every winter for the sole purpose of having ice-cream on Sunday afternoon through the summer at their gatherings and scarcely a Sunday went by but some or all of the family were there to enjoy the treat.

This particular year they had to go almost to Orleans to find enough water and ice to fill the house. While at their father's on the previous Sunday making plans for the fill, as it took several teams and wagons and lunch for horses and humans as well, Charley said to Jack and Sam: "Now with you fellows batching, it won't be necessary for you to bring lunch. Renna will put up enough for you."

Sam grumbled. "Oh. I suppose you think we can't cook". So on the stated morning everyone started out early in the cold from their various homes to go to the appointed place

to cut and load the ice.

Charley, on the way down was walking beside his wagon to keep warm. And just why he picked up that little dead pig lying by the road side and tossed it on the hay in the wagon, he didn't know then, for he had no idea of using it in the manner he did.

When he got to the designated place, several were there down over the river bank sawing ice, building a fire, etc. As he drove up he noticed Jack and Sam's wagon and sure enough there they had brought the forbidden lunch.

A scheme soon took form in Charley's mind. Sure, why not play a joke on Sam. And since everyone was out of sight this was the logical time. Charley removed the lunch from the grapebasket and slipped in Mr. Piggy, who fit just to perfection. And with all the wrappings tucked smoothly back into place he went to join the ice harvesters.

At noon Charley heated the coffee and spread out the lunch and called dinner. Sam came boastfully up the river bank and said, "Did you get the lunch out of our wagon? I want to prove to you that bachelor fare isn't so bad".

Charley said "No", and reminded him he was told to forget it.

Out Sam went after the basket and back he came to display his dinner contribution.

Try to imagine his let-down feeling and shock when he uncovered the dead pig.

"Charley, you big fool," he said and a good Coffey wrestle cusued. Sam and Charley rolled over and over in the snow, down the river bank and almost into the hole cut in the ice. All this was accompanied with the side splitting laughter of the group of brothers.

Why some of the second generation of Coffey boys were not killed by some of their pranks will always be a mystery to those who knew them. I cite three examples of what could have been fatal to most people but did not seem to faze the Coffey's. These boys were all very large men. They were around 6 ft. in height and weighed from 180 to 250 lbs. Ben, Bill and Art harvested their wheat together. One day as they were preparing to leave for the harvest field, Ben was standing in the back of a header box. Art held up his hand for Ben to give him a lift into the box. When Ben reached down and took hold of Art's hand. Art not realizing that the floor of that header box was covered with shattered wheat, making Ben's footing very precarous, gave Ben's arm a jerk. Ben came out of the header box

head first falling from six to eight feet and landed on his head and shoulders. He was badly shaken up and very stiff for a few days but never missed an hours work in the harvest field.

Another example of what could have been a bad accident occurred when Bill, Art, and Ben were drawing the sills of a header box together. They had wrapped a chain around the sills and placed a crowbar in the chain to twist it up. Either Bill or Art was striking the sills with a 6 lb. sledge, Ben was twisting the chain with a crowbar. The sledge struck a glancing blow, flew off the sills, striking Ben in the shoulder and jaw, knocking him down but did not knock him out. Once more he was stiff and sore for several days but never laid up.

These boys delighted in such innocent fun as attaching themselves to the wagon wheel by bracing with feet and hands and having the driver encourage the teams to an excess speed. This got to be such tame play that some of them climbed to the windmill wheel and had a brother turn the windmill into gear.

Strange to say, they all grew to manhood with good sound minds and bodies. They have been a family of which we, the posterity, can justly be proud, for such good, honest men as these are the backbone of our nation.
