The name James Waightville Coffey has not been found on the rolls on file in this office of Company E, 6th Regiment North Carolina Infantry, Confederate States Army, which rolls cover the period from June 20, 1861, to December 31, 1864. One Joseph W. Coffey served in that company.

Isaac E. Avery was a Captain in Company E, and Charles F. Fisher was a Colonel in the above mentioned regiment.

It is deemed proper to remark, however, that the collection of Confederate States Army records on file in the War Department is far from complete, and the failure to find the name of any person thereon is by no means conclusive evidence that such person did not serve at some period not covered by the records on file in this office.

The 1st Manassas, Morgan's Command, has not been identified.

Dear Sirs:

We are in receipt of advise from the War Department which states that the name James W. Coffey has not been found on the rolls of Company E, 6th H. Cav. Infantry, and that these rolls are from June 20th, 1861 to December 1st, 1864.

That record also shows Capt. Isaac E. Avery and Col. Chas S. Fisher in command.

One Joseph W. Coffey served in that Company, but it does not seem likely that our Mr. Coffey would not know his own name.

May I suggest that you get in touch with your client and see what explanation he may make of this seeming contradiction of his claim, so that we may present it to the Board of Trustees together with this record, and his application when they meet June 1st.

I, James W. Coffey upon my oath state and depose that my name given at my birth was Joseph W. Coffey; that I enlisted in Company E. 6th. N. Car. Infantry in April 1861 under the name of Joseph W. Coffey and carried the name of Joseph until the fall of 1862, when it appeared to be dangerous for Joseph W. Coffey on account of his activities against the union forces, the activities being those of a scout such as burning bridges and such work in the rear of the enemy lines as would harass them as much as possible. In the fall of 1862, I assumed the name of ~~Joseph~~^{James} W. Coffey under which name I have lived since that date; that I am the Joseph W. ~~Ex~~ Coffey whose record was reported to the Confederate Home.
