# Old Rappahannock and Essex Counties

The established Church in Colonial Virginia was the Church of England. As in England, parishes were "local units of ecclesiastical and community organization". The Virginia General Assembly, through legislation, created parishes and defined their boundaries. As the population of Colonial Virginia grew, new parishes were formed and boundary lines changed.


Although the Church of England was dis-established as the official Church following the American Revolution and most of the duties of the vestry turned over to county officials, the parishes continued in existence. The parish boundaries were also used as geographic designations with the residence of parties to deeds being given by parish and county. These designations may be useful in determining in which part of the county the persons resided and the land being conveyed was located.

The charts below diagram the changes in the parishes of Old Rappahannock and Essex Counties from 1656 until the present.

Old Rappahannock County became extinct in 1692 when it was divided into Essex and Richmond Counties.

North Farnham Parish fell wholly into Richmond County at the division.

# Amelia County, 1735

Charles City County

Raleigh Parish, Diocese of Southern Virginia, was formed by the same Act which established Amelia County. When Amelia County was divided in 1748 to form Prince Edward County, Raleigh Parish became coterminous with Amelia County.

At the Virginia State Library there is a photostat of a Vestry Book 1790 and 1827-1926. The records are far from complete and contain only miscellaneous entries. It is said to be a transcription of the original records. There is also a manuscript copy of the Vestry Book 1790 and 1827-1895 which appears to be those used in the transcription listed above. The mother church of this parish was St. John's Church, Grub Hill. Some later records of this church are available at Christ Episcopal Church, Amelia, VA 23002.

Amherst Parish, 1761-1808, Diocese of Southwestern Virginia, originally covered all of Amherst County. It was created from St. Anne's Parish, when Amherst County was made from Albemarle County. When Nelson County was formed from Amherst County, the name "Amherst Parish" became extinct as Nelson Parish became the accepted name for the parish within the new Nelson County. Lexington Parish was the other parish in Amherst County. When Lexington Parish was split in 1876 the name Amherst Parish was given to that portion which had been in the original Amherst Parish.
